


Shockeysville Church and part of the crowd at the last reunion

Elmer Shockey

Born September 30, 1900. Player and Builder.

I am happy to submit the name of Elmer Shockey to be considered for the Saskatchewan Baseball hall of fame as a player and builder.

Elmer is the eldest of five Shockey brothers who all played ball in the early days, particularly in the country west of Saskatoon and in Saskatoon. The Shockey name is well known in baseball circles as far as the Alberta border.

Elmer started playing organized baseball with the Saskatoon Fawcetts in the early 1920's. During the 30's and 40's Elmer played for Vanscoy, Delisle, Grandors, Langham, Cory and Tessier, to name a few. He also played at the Saskatoon Exhibition when these teams were entered.

Enclosed is a copy of a clipping form the Daily Star Of July 4, 1922: Vanscoy Trio Plays Big Part in Hardware Team's Surprise Win

Fawcetts again did the unexpected last night, winning another ball game but this time it was more or less a fluke. The Fifth Battalion took the short end of a 9-7 score. The Shockey brothers from Vanscoy, played a prominent part during the evening and the three of them shared no less than 18 put-outs.

17 Year-Old Catcher

Ed Shockey who did the catching for the Hardware crew is only 17 and his work was good. It was his first appearance in City League gall and he performed like a veteran. His brother Carl Shockey, in left field, had plenty to do with five put-outs to his credit. His running catch of Harry Rooney's long drive in the ninth was one of the most spectacular in many games.

This bears out the fact that the Shockeys played a major role in maintaining interest in the game of baseball.

Elmer had a family of five boys and three girls and he encouraged them all to play ball.

After his active days as a player of baseball were over he took up coaching. For ten years he coached the Vanscoy Caps girls' softball team, the first rural team to take the champoinship in class A ball. Three of his sons played with the Ambassador Motors team when they won the provincials in 1960-61. One of his daughters played softball at the National Level.

To further substantiate the fact that Elmer was a builder and helped his community enclosed is a copy of a plaque which Elmer received from the Delisle Community in 1973.

It is hoped that Elmer Shockey, being the eldest of the Shockey brothers, will be elected to the Hall of Fame and that the Shockey name will be remembered in baseball circles.

Elmer, at the present time, has had a stroke and is in a wheel chair in the Sanatorium Nursing Home. He understands what you say but is unable to talk.

It might be worthy to note here that Lem Shockey, the father of the five brothers, played simi-pro baseball in Springfield, Ohio and was invited to play professional with Chicago. After he came to Saskatchewan in 1910 he played some ball and did some coaching as well.

In August we decided to take a trip. My arthritis was so bad I couldn't do any housework and Ralph is anemic and is loosing his eyesight, so decided to see some people and places while he can still see well enough to enjoy it. We had always wanted to go to Canada and we had some Shockey friends there who had been to some of the Reunions so that is where we headed.

When we arrived in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan we called Dale and Phyllis. Dale met us at the Motel and insisted that we have dinner with them. That night we met their son and daughter-in-law and their beautiful little grand daughter. But before we went to their house they took us by the Nursing Home to see Elmer Shockey who has had a stroke. At first he didn't seem to know us but then he recognized us! He and Ralph just sat and held hands. Elmer can't speak but he let us know how glad he was to see us. It was hard to leave him.

The next day Dale and Phyllis took us to their Summer house on the lake, a $2\frac{1}{2}$ hour drive north. It certainly is beautiful up there. I don't think the towns that far north are on the map!

The next day we rested. Both of us were tired but Ralph won't rest unless he is forced to. The next day Dale took us to see Elmer's old farm, Cliff's Insurance Office in Vanscoy and some of the other Shockey farms. Then we went to Norma and Keith Colborn's for lunch. Norma served a lovely delicious lunch. Then she showed us around her chicken ranch. I don't remember how many thousand chickens she has but the whole operation was very interesting. That night Deane Shockey, Elmer's wife, had us to her house for dinner. They brought Elmer home for the week end and she got almost all of their family there to meet us. There was Carl and Kate from North Battleford. Kate is Deane's sister and Carl is Elmer's brother; also their children Hal and Lil Shockey, Glen and Helen Shockey, Norma and Keith Colborn, Eleanor and Howard Ryan, Verne and Joyce Shockey, Cliff and Jackie Shockey. Absent was Shirley and Ron Kowalski who live in Regina. Some grandchildren were there too. What a lovely family!

We visited Linda Shockey and her parents in Taber, Alberta, Canada. Linda is quite interested in family history. Orvil and his wife insisted that we have breakfast with them before we left. Linda came to one of the Reunions. She is in College studying law.

We visited Luther Shockey and his wife in Portland, Oregon, also his daughter, Linda. He and Ralph have corresponded a lot and Luther is writing his memoirs.

Harriett Elizabeth Robbins, daughter of Franklin Shockey and Susan Emily Lower was born 27 September 1888 in West Virginia.

Died 1 October 1986 at age 98. The was the widow of Seth Jefferson Robbins who died 11 January 1949.

She left West Virginia and moved to Arkansas when she was 4 years old. In later years she has lived with her daughter and son-in-law, Ardella and Dick Stafford in Ukiah, California.

She came to the Reunion when it was held in Martinsburg, West Virginia several years ago. She has been a very special friend to us for many years. She supplied much information for the Shockey History and Genealogy when we were researching and wrote to us frequently and often made small donations for mailing cost. She kept busy with something all the time; made quilts, jams, jellies, canned vegetables and attended Church regularly. Last year she sent me a baby quilt she made for my youngest grandson because he was born on her birthday. She had a quilt almost finished when she died. In fact she had worked on it the day before.

They had a open house birthday party for her on her 98th birthday and about 50 friends and relatives attended

The next day she was taken ill and they did emergency surgery but she never recovered. She was too weak to weak to survive.

She was a remarkable lady and will be sorely missed by friends and relatives alike.

Edith A. Shockey died on 16 February 1984 at the age of 95. Her husband, Everett, died 29 January 1955. They had lived in their home in Abilene, Kansas since 1919 when it was built. Everett was the son of a poincer family and had been associated with the Shockey and Landes Furniture and Hardware Co. for many years. Everett and Edith had no children and are only survived by nieces and nephews.

Orville L. Shockey , formerly of Detroit, Michigan, passed away in Fort Collins, Colo. in March 1986. He was the son of Orville Deville Shockey and Eleanor Thompson. He was born 26 April 1911 in Dayton, Chio. He was 75 years old.


