We now have s Shockey Family Cookbook! It was compiled by Mrs Mary Giarrusso of St. Louis, Missouri. The recipes are Shockey favorites and submitted by Shockeys and decendents of Shockeys. Some of the recipes are quite old and have been handed down through the generations.

The bood is beautifully done in a loose leaf binder with a picture of Shockeyville Church on the front. There are 178 pages. The following item was sent to me by Mrs Neal Shockey of Mabie, West Virginia. She got it from Anna Belle Mundy who gave me permission to share it. I had read it before, but not in time to include it in the Shockey History and Genealogy. It was titled " An incident in Life"

Osage County Chronicle Thursday February 27, 1890- Grandma Markley died last week at the advanced age of 94 years and 5 months. She was burried in Highland Cemetary. Grandma was the oldest person in Osage County. she was the mother of 17 children, five of whom survive her.

Burlingame Chronicle- The death of this old lady calls to our minds an incident in her life which we are inclined to give, in 1884 the Lyndon Coronet Band was called to Carbondale for some occasion and circumstances were such that the band had to return home on Sunday or remain at Carbondale untill Monday. So the boys concluded that they would come home on the Sabbath. The day was a hot, sultry one, and when they arrived at Mr. Markley's place, just north of the Phelon farm they stopped for water, and while there the old lady ask her daughter in law, Mrs Markley, to request the band to play, Saying that in all her life she had not heard music by a band of that kind. The band boys, although it was on the Sabbath day complied with the request and played a number of sacred and national airs, shich she readily recognized, and while they played she sat in the doorway with a grandchild on her knee and great tears wended their way down her aged and wrinkleq face. It seemed that the music refreshed her memery of the past and the pleasant memories she seemed to enjoy was more than her kind old soul could stand, and every emotion of her being was brought out in manifestation of satisfaction of being so respected by 13 or 14 young men just on the verge of the prime of life. Thi is an incident which we and probably all the members of the band at that time will never forget. Her daughter in law after the boys refreshed themselves with another drought of water, brought some delicious cake and other delicacies and enjoyed an hour of pleasure and refreshments, Mrs Markley deceased if her age above given is correct was 88 years of age.

Peace be with her, and may the judgement morn be as bright and happy for her as was that eventful Sabbath day to her and the Coronet Band

P.S. Grama Markley was a little woman, so short that when she sat on a kitchen chair her feet didn't touch the floor. Also, eight of her children had brown eyes, eight blue and the last one, a son had one brown eye and one blue eye.

U.S. red tape keeps family separated

About 2,400 kilometres and United States immigration rules separate Barb Milanesa, a Canadian, and her husband Thomas, an American, these days.

But thanks to the telephone, they keep in daily contact.

Barb Milanesa has been stranded in Saskatoon with her 10-month-old son Tony for more than two months, after being refused re-entry to the U.S. Her husband has gone back to their Long Island, N.Y., home to look after the roofing business he co-owns.

"The family's predicament came about as a result of visiting Saskatoon just before Christmas.

Barb, a former Saskatoon resident who has lived in the U.S. since 1980, had applied for permanent U.S. residency after her student visa ran out in February 1986. Her hearing was scheduled for Jan. 20 this year.

But when her grandfather in Saskatoon suffered a stroke, she wanted to see him and applied for permission to leave the U.S. for nine days, she said in an interview this week. A New York City immigration officer refused her application.

"He said having a sick grandfather wasn't a good enough reason to leave. We were told the situation had to involve a mother, father, spouse or child."

Any decision to grant temporary permission to leave is at the discretion of the district immigration officer, Barbara Moore, public affairs officer at the U.S. consulate in Toronto, explained.

"She should have been aware that if your residency status was still pending, you can't leave the country."

Milanesa, 24, is re-applying for American residency through the Toronto consulate, but her papers

have not yet arrived from New York City.

The New York office is the busiest one in North America and things take a long time to be processed through there, said Moore.

In hindsight, Milanesa acknowledged that she and her husband thought with their hearts and not their heads when they came to Canada in December.

"I regret not waiting until January 20. But I would have kicked myself if I didn't get to see my grandfather. Just to see him at Christmas... the grin on his face made it worth it."

The teacher in the window of the former one-room school house south of Pontiac is muffled in a fur-collared coat with a scarf draped around her neck for added warmth. A cowboy-style hat sits on a mop of soft blonde curls.

Miss Schultz appears ready to take her students out for recess and has looked that way for over 15 years after a little tot named Susie adopted and named the manikin teacher.

Susie's uncle, Clarence Shockey, bought the school at the Redwell and prison roads intersection after it closed in 1966.

He acquired a few manikins at store close-outs and other sales knowing the hours of fun they would bring to his niece.

What seems to have brought the most chuckles are the three people working in his garden --manikins again, and convincingly real from the road in their weatherbeaten clothes, hats, and glasses. The one in the center sports a pipe and stands in the midst of greens like he's running the show. "They keep the birds out of my strawberries," Shockey explained.

It's not unusual for people going by to stop for a second or third look, he said. One time a fellow

yelled out the window, "What the heck those people doing out there?" And Shockey teased back, "Just talking, they ain't got the garden cleaned up yet."

To look at the size and neatness of his garden, one would think his three gardeners are really working out there, but Shockey does it all himself. Rows of vegetables are planted where swing sets once squeaked in rhythm to the school kids shooting their feet towards the sky.

Although the kids are gone now, the 79-year-old Shockey gives the place a spark of life "always coming up with something new" as he tinkers around in green work pants, plaid flannel shirts and a farmers cap.

And sometimes, after a day of making what he calls his crazy little whirl-a-ma-jigs and whatnots, Shockey sits on a bench in the shade of an ash tree with his little dog and watches the windmills whistling songs as they twirl in the breeze.

This year, the couple celebrated their 63rd wedding anniversary. Shockey obviously has a green thumb — or two — and thinks that gardening is easy if you give the plants what they want.

"I never had much problem with growing anything," said Shockey. "I just try to do it right."

Although Shockey's not sure, he believes the male cardinal is the same one to visit his garden last year. But then, in the bird world, word probably spreads about the goodies on the Shockey back porch.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Shockey feed the birds in their back yard. A call or a whistle usually brings all sorts of feathered friends right into their midst. And sometimes upon it.

"Some of these little birds are so tame that they sit right on your shoulder," said Shockey. "I laid peanuts on my chest once and this little bird followed the trail up to my head."

Shockey certainly has a way with birds, but his gardens are a delight to behold. His main garden behind his house on Third Avenue has apple trees groaning with ripening fruit; raspberries, strawberries, cucumbers, tomatoes and a grape arbor with enough grapes to make Welch's envious.

Shockey's garden begins when most of us are still shoveling snow off the walk. His tomato plants are started from seed. He likes the Big Boy and Better Boy varieties.

When Shockey bought the lots, the entire area was "farmed" until their house was built.

The National Reunion of the Shockey Family will be held in Grove City on July 4-5, 1987 at the E.L. Evans Senior Center and Windsor Park Shelter House.

This family, from whom Grove City resident Harriet Shockey Albrecht (Albrecht) is descended, holds its annual national reunion which is attended by 150-300 family members from all over the U.S. and Canada. The leader of the national group is Ralph N. Shockey of Berkeley Springs, West Virginia. He and his wife, Mavis, have published two large volumes of family history and genealogy and are presently working on a third volume.

Every second year, the family gathers at Shockeyville Church in the mountains of northern Frederick County, Virginia. The church was built in 1872 by Rev. John Shockey, and a bustling mountain community grew up around it. A fire nearly destroyed the village in 1904, and it was never rebuilt. But the church, although was damaged by flames, still stands and regular church services continue to the present time.

When the Shockey family meets, there is a real "homecoming" with services, hymn-sings, picnics on mountain meadows, visits to the graves of ancestors, and stories of bygone days told by older family members.

Two years ago, the reunion was held in Thousand Oaks Park at Kirksville, Missouri. Last year it was at the Shockeyville Church. The Grove City branch of the family feels very honored to be hosting this year's gathering and would like to invite friends who might remember the Shockey family to join us on Saturday, July 4th, or Sunday, July 5th, for visiting and reminiscing.

Johann Christoffel Schaake, born about 1715, came to American from the Palatinate of Germany. He arrived at the Port of Philadelphia on September 10, 1737 on the ship, "Snow Molly". He and his wife, Barbara,

had at least nine children. Now known as John Christopher Shockey, he settled in Bucks County, Pennsylvania. His descendants are now scattered through the U.S. and Canada.

The Grove City Shockeys are descended from Jacob Shockey, who migrated from Berkeley County, Virginia (now West Virginia); to Elk Township, Athens County (now Vinton County), Ohio, in 1821. One of Jacob's grandsons, Jacob Henry Shockey, was the father of Harriet Eliza Albrecht (Albright), who is now a resident at Monterey Nursing Inn in Grove City.

Jacob Henry married Jennie Gelina Woltz in McArthur, Ohio, in 1882, and they were the parents of three children. This family all eventually lived in and around Grove City.

Claire Camille married William E. Albrecht (Albright). Their daughter, Kathryn Darnell, still lives on Dudley Avenue on the site of the old Shockey family home with her daughter and son-in-law, Judy and Pete Suttles.

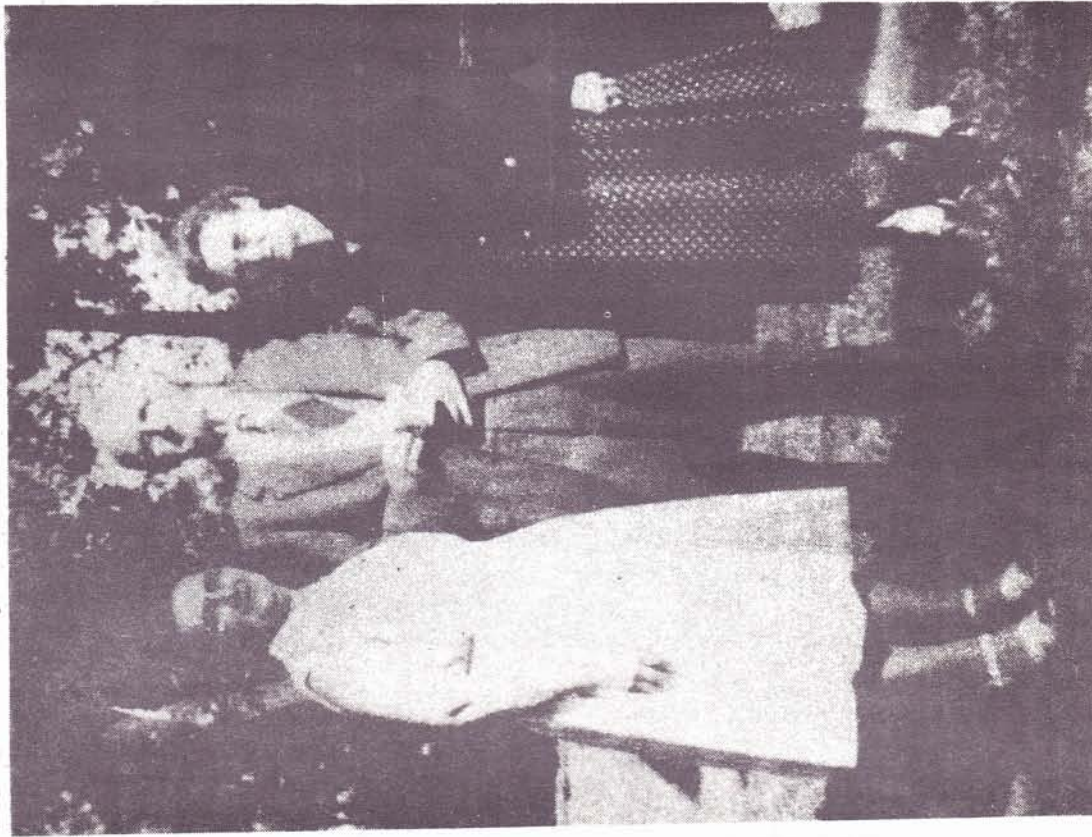
John Floyd married Myrtle Sharp and in earlier years lived in Grove City, then moved to Columbus. They had two sons—John Robert, who now lives in New Albany, and Lawrence Allen, who, since retirement from school teaching, now lives in McArthur.

Harriet Eliza married Luther E. Albrecht (Albright), a brother of Claire's husband, Will. They had one daughter, Margaret White, who now lives on Voeller Avenue in Grove City. Her daughter and son-in-law, Marilyn and Bill England, also live on Voeller Avenue.

The Shockeys have had a strong tradition in musical ability down through the years. Harriet learned to play the piano as a small child and played along with her father and his brothers, who were all fine musicians. They had their own band which was known all over southern Ohio and at one time played at the Chicago World's Fair.

Many local residents will recall

Harriet's years of playing piano for many community activities. She played for many dances held on the old portable wood platforms, for local minstrel shows, for U.S.O. dances during World War II, and then for many years for square dances, with Rush Thomas as caller.
The father, Jacob Henry Shockey, died in Grove City in 1929. The mother, Jennie, (who was a nurse and mid-wife), died in 1936. These deaths are recorded in early issues of The Grove City Record. Son John died in 1966. Claire and her husband, Will, both passed away in 1974 after nearly 70 years of marriage. Harriet, widowed since 1952, at age 95 is the only surviving member of a generation of Shockeys.

A WORD FROM YOUR GENEALOGIST AND HISTORIAN, RALPH N. SHOCKEY:

Several of the Shockey family have requested that I check these items and reply to them.

The Shockey Chronicles, Vol I & II by Lt. Col. Donald E. Shockey and his wife, Thelma I. (Peterson) Shockey has raised these questions.

Vol. II of the Shockey Chronicles, page 1179 says that Donald E. Shockey was born at Lafayette, Indiana and lived there until 1966. The attached archives record which has his name at the bottom and was submitted to the Archives of the Mormon Library in Salt Lake City, Utah on or before 1966 shows the following:

Christian Shockey had a middle initial C and Mary Welch's name was Mary Ann Welch; that No. 4, Mary or Polly Shockey married Samuel Findley, that No. 8, Margaret or Peggy Shockey married Christian Markley; yet on page 865, Vol. II they have Margaret Shockey, daughter of Abraham and Margaret Shockey marrying Christian Markley.

Subject: Christian Shockey

The Court Martial & pardon of Christian Shockey on 12 June 1778 at Yorktown at which he was sentenced to death for desertion and stealing horses; at the bottom of page 14 and the top of page 15 it states that Shockey was pardoned by General George Washington. Notice that he forgot to state that the pardon was for CHRISTOPHER Shockey of the 11th Pennsylvania Regiment; leading us to believe that Christian C. Shockey was actually Christian Christopher Shockey

Vol. II of the Shockey Chronicles, page 862 shows Abraham Shockey & wife Margaret, with a son, Abraham, born about 1788. From Abraham's Bible writing dated 1855, it shows no son, Abraham, and that his first son, John, was born 1795. The 1800 census of Alleganey County, Maryland shows Abraham Shockey and wife, Margaret with one male to 10, and 3 females to 16. The one male would have been John born in 1795; showing no son, Abraham in 1788.

We appreciate anyone pointing out our mistakes and we hope we have done enough research to satisfy those who have made these requests. There have been other questions which, at my age of 84 and having poor health; I have not been able to get the answers yet. Some copies of supporting documents are included and all of the other material that I have will be on hand at the reunion. I hope my health continues to improve because I am looking foreward to seeing you all in July!

In General Orders of the 12th. instant the Commissary General of Issues was, thro' mistake inserted instead of the Commissary General of Purchases, who is to observe said order.

TO COLONEL THOMAS HARTLEY

Head Quarters, June 14, 1778.

Sir: I this Evening received your Letter of the 13th. Instant, with the papers to which it alluded.

It appears to me, from a consideration of the respective proceedings, that both King¹² and Shockey¹³ might be executed agreeably to their sentences, without the imputation of a rigorous severity. However as the Court Martial have interposed a petition in favour of the former, which has also received a sort of countenance from Congress, by their suspending his execution, I grant him a pardon. I also pardon Shockey, as

the crime of which he has been convicted, altho' clearly proved according to the proceedings, does not seem to me to deserve death more than King's; Indeed, in the conduct of King, there were some circumstances leading to consequences of greater political criminality.

With respect to the affairs of your Regiment, I should suppose nothing will be finally settled before you arrive here, if you march at the time you mention.

I am sorry for the indisposition of Colo. Connor¹⁴ and hope he will soon recover. I am etc.¹⁵

* TO JOSEPH REED

Valley-Forge, June 15, 1778.

Dear Sir: I thank you very much for your friendly favor of this date, and your polite attention in submitting the draught of your Letter to Govr. Johnstone to my perusal. I return it again, but before you transcribe a fair copy I would wish to see you upon the subject of it; perhaps there are some parts of it, which might receive a small alteration. In the present situation of things, all correspondence of this nature must, and will be weighed and scanned with a scrupulous exactness; and even compliment, if carried far, may not pass entirely uncensured.¹⁶

There is another consideration wch. weighs with me, Congress, at this instant perhaps, are deliberating on an answer to give the Commissioners to the address wch. they have received from them, should your letter therefore (considered as coming from a Member) contains sentiments repugnant to theirs, an unfavourable use more than probably, will be made of it. I am, etc.

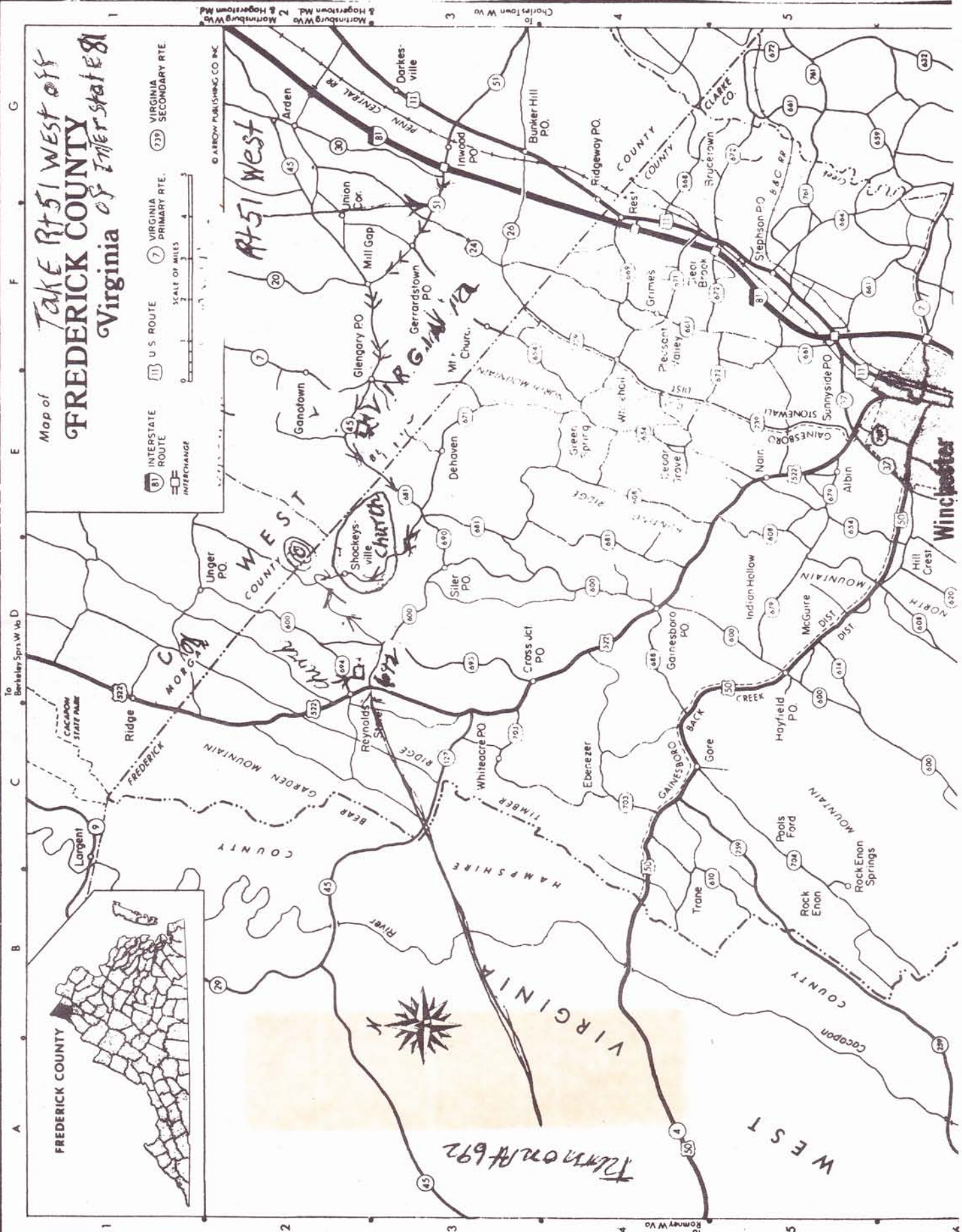

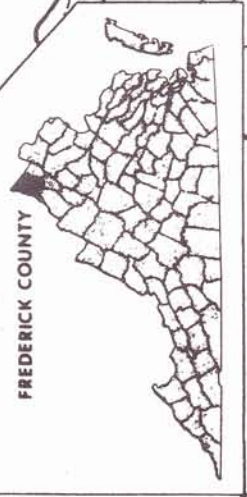
