
to have more news about this at our reunion.



Bud says he can't be here this year but plans to attend next year. Leslie will be here with his new "contribution" to computer genealogy.

Now we need for all of you to get all of the new data in to us. When Ralph and I gathered information for the books, that was 20 years ago. A lot has happened since then and we had mistakes that need correcting too. I am including a blank Family Group Sheet which has more space than the ones I have usually used. Most of you know how to fill them out. Send them to me and I will get them to whoever is currently working on that branch of the family. Dates and places of birth & marriage are very important. I need a separate sheet for each of your married children. Take that sheet and Xerox as many copies as you need. Do you realize that no Shockey descendent will ever have to go back and begin in 1737 to find their Roots? They won't have to spend days, weeks or months in libraries, old moldy Court House Basements or trudging through cemeteries in all sorts of weather and often through brush and green briers looking for dates of births, deaths, marriages & places of birth. They don't have to read census records for hours and hours until your head aches, your eyes feel like they are crossed and your neck feels like you are a victim of whip-lash. And now we can add pictures!!!! I just wish that all of those who are no longer with us could know what they helped us to accomplish.

I know Ralph sometimes doubted that I would keep the reunions going and continue doing research or that I would still be working to get all of it in the computers. I promised him that I would, but after living with me for nearly 44 years, he knew that even though our goals were usually the same, we had some real different ways of getting there. He always said "never put off until tomorrow, that which you can do today" or maybe yesterday or the day before. I always thought " why do something today that you can put off until tomorrow because tomorrow you might not even have to do it." He worried about everything; I worried about almost nothing. He didn't realize that I was just about as "hung up" on this project as he was but our priorities were somewhat different.

A lot of good researchers sent us data from all over the United States and Canada to get us where we are now so with your help and cooperation, we will get it all brought up to date. Maybe with all of the new information, we will find some of the connections that have eluded us so far. There are several real important links that need to be proven one way or another. It could be impossible ever to find all of them due to poor record-keeping years ago and the houses that burned and destroyed what records folks did keep and during the Civil War, many Court Houses were virtually destroyed. We may never be able to trace all of you completely, but I find new information all the time. Not a week goes by that I don't hear from someone and often they provide me with a new piece of information. It doesn't ever end.

At our general meeting Scott Luttrell, church treasurer, said that since the church was so in need or repair, he had taken out a personal loan to put vinyl siding on it instead of painting. We felt that the interest was too high so we took up a collection to help pay off the loan. We collected just about half of it.

A few weeks later Lesley Shockey called Scott and offered help. All of the plans came together. The church had their annual yard party which was quite successful. Several others made cash donations toward the siding. The material was bought and delivered. Some preliminary work was done a week or so ahead, Scott recruited all of the free help he could get; he is one of a family of 18 so he had a good many brothers, sisters and cousins to call on. Les Shockey had talked to his father and brothers Gene and David who had done this sort of work professionally and they decided to donate their time and experience to help do the job. Their father, Harley Shockey who is 79 years of age, insisted on helping too. It was a 5 1/2 hour drive from where they live, so they drove up here the night before. On a beautiful Saturday morning in early September the "help" came. Scott's sisters and I fixed lunch-fried chicken, mashed potatoes & gravy, hot rolls,, vegetables, cake & Pies. Those ladies are great cooks.

The work progressed without a hitch--so far as I could tell. It was a perfect example of cooperation. People came, gave what time they could and when they left to fulfill their other obligations, there was always another pair of hands to take his place.

It didn't all get finished on Saturday. Harley, Gene and David went home but Les stayed to help on Sunday. They got started right after Services and worked until almost sundown. All got finished except part of the belltower. Scott got some volunteer help and finished it a couple of weeks later.

He gave me a list of those who gave their time and loaned them boards & scaffolding. It would be impossible to list those who donated money. All of the time and work and donations will be appreciated for many years to come by all of us who worship in that church and also those who come there to visit from time to time. The church is warm and comfortable now, no cold air comes in, and I know it will be more comfortable in Summer too.



Marie Spielman is no exception.

Friends and family speak with ease about her amazing, unselfish ability to give of herself and her time. Take, for instance, Christmas.

Last year, Spielman's house looked like Santa's bak-

ery at the North Pole.

The cabinet tops in her kitchen were covered with homemade pies, cakes, and bread. The upstairs' guest bedroom was filled with trays of a variety of

Spielman-made cookies and candy.

Judging from the amount of stuff, it was almost impossible to imagine how one person could be responsible for all of it.

Marie Spielman had made it all to give to

those she loves.

For days before Christmas, Spielman would make trips up and down the steps to fill boxes with goodies. Then, she would either deliver them or invite a friend to drop by and pick up a surprise package.

Then there's the other 364 days of the year when she surprises a friend with some of her special-made goodies, which can also include homemade soups and jellies and vegetables she's

canned.

It's possible that Spielman was born with the quality to share because she admits that she's always been that way.

"It comes from the heart, every bit of it," she said modestly from her home off Berryville

"I've always done things like this. My husband used to ask me when I was going to stop and I'd tell him that I would keep doing it as long as I was able. It's my way of showing people that I love them and think about them.

Most of her cooking is done in the evening. "That's when I get lonesome," said Spielman,

who's been a widow for 11 years.

Spielman said her mother and sister taught her to cook. "I started cooking when I was real young. My sister is a wonderful cook. I use her recipe for bread and my mother's recipe for pumpkin pie."

Spielman was born 72 years ago in Shock-

eysville, a community named after her family, the Shockeys.

Her great-grandfather and grandfather were ministers. Her father, North Hill, carried the mail from Shockeysville to White Hall. Her mother, Lottie, cared for Spielman, her sister, and seven brothers.

When Spielman was in grade school, the family moved to Martinsburg, W.Va., where her father worked

for the city.

After graduating from high school, Spielman worked in Martinsburg for the Perfection Garment Company as a seamstress. "I used to say that if I ever got out of there, I'd never sew anything else. But it was good money at that time."



Spielman and her husband, Chester, attended the same high school, but they didn't know each other until they met at a picnic.

She laughed as she remembered their meeting. "He had a date and I had a date. I saw him and said, "That's the one,' and he said the same thing.

"We left our dates and he took me home and after that we never dated anyone else again."

The Spielmans dated five years before they were

married in 1941.

"Chester was in service when we got married," she said. "We'd planned a wedding at my home and they canceled his furlough. So, I went to Columbia, S.C., where he was stationed, and we were married there."

The couple lived in Columbia for a year, until he was sent overseas during World War II.

Spielman said her husband was a military policeman and one of Gen. (later President) Dwight D. Eisenhower's personal guards.

"Chester told me he saw Eisenhower give his shoes to a soldier who he said needed them more," Spielman said. "Chester never forgot that.'

When Spielman's husband was discharged, the couple lived in Martinsburg until 1958, when they moved to Winchester. They eventually built a house in Stephenson, where they were living when he died.

I have done this newsletter in bits and pieces again. I try to keep related items together but sometimes, like this year, I have to take them as I get them. I can't wait until I get everything together before I get started. A lot of time goes into this and I don't want to leave anything out. Les was one of the last ones to send his contribution in, but his father has been quite ill and Les was spending time with him and working full time.
