

FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

March 12, 1998

Greetings:

This is the 11th year as your President that I have sent my love and well wishes to all of you Shockeys out there. I am thrilled as well as humbled when I think of all the Shockey homes that our Newsletter reaches through out the country. My prayers go out to any of you that have been victims of El Nino weather. We have been very fortunate here in eastern Pennsylvania and have had a very mild winter.

Last year's reunion in Shockeysville wasn't as large as the year before in Plano, TX but we were able to accomplish our goals. The weather was great and we ran all of our tours. We kicked off our Shockey Land Project and the members approved some changes and additions to our slate of Directors and Officers. We thank all those that were present and you will find a complete list of our Directors and Officers in another

part of the Newsletter.

Since the reunion we continued to have a steady flow of contributions for the Shockey Land Project so that we were able to pay the second installment of \$5000 before the end of 1997. Our last payment (\$3750) is not due till Dec.30, 1998. We will need additional funds for a Title Search and some maintenance. Between our newsletter publicity and our reunion we hope that we can accomplish this by the end of the reunion in July so that we are not in a bind at the end of the year. A lot of the Shockeys may not know of our land purchase. This plot is five acres next to the church property that was once part of Shockeysville. The reunion in 1999 will be in Shockeysville and will be the 12th Reunion since our Incorporation. It is our plan to dedicate this land as a Memorial to the Shockey family. The land around the old foundation of Maggie Shockey's home will be landscaped and planted with local flowers and shrubs. We plan to bury a time capsule. It will contain the names of all the members of our Fellowship, the names of all those who contributed to the property, and the history of Shockeysville. With the approval of the Directors other items may be added.

But coming back to this year we have another exciting time ahead of us, the 1998 reunion in Parkersburg, WV. Les and Naomi Shockey invited us into their area and their piece of Shockey history. Les is a descendant of Abraham, the 5th son of John Christopher. Les will show us some of the local homesteads as well as the grave of "old" Abraham. They have made all the arrangements for us to be comfortable and for us to have a memorable reunion. Marie, Les, Naomi, Jane and I expect to

be at the motel on July 2nd to greet folks as they arrive.

As President I get to tell you all about the good and exciting "stuff"; such as the land purchase is going well and we should have no problem making our Dec 1998 committment. It follows that it is also my responsibility to tell you of our concerns. Dan Shockey our Vice-Pres/Treasurer called to give me this report. The last two years our administrative expenses have exceeded our income by \$1000 each year. If that

happens this year we won't be able to cover it. (Donations for the land purchase are not involved; they are in a seperate account.) We need to cut expenses or increase our income. It would be difficult to cut expenses when our main expense is the Newsletter...the backbone of our organization. It cost over \$1500 in 1996 and over \$2000 in 1997. We send the newsletter to all who request it...Free. We would like to continue to do that. This practice has carried the Newsletter into most of the States including Alaska and parts of Canada.

Our administrative income comes from New Memberships-\$5 per adult, Annual dues-\$5 per adult, funds from cap/shirt sales and donations (to general fund or newsletter). Donations to the church go directly to the church. Marie's column is in another part of the Newsletter. Make sure you read her report. She will give her insight into the problem and where you can

send your help.

We have a great thing going here. When you talk to other family reunion groups they are amazed at what we have accomplished. We need to support it. Get all of your Shockey families involved. Check out all those Aunts, Uncles and cousins. There is help coming in the near future. Les Shockey and Bud Roseberry, Directors and Computer/Genealogical experts are working diligently to computerize available data. Soon we will be able to establish fees and then offer print-outs of requested Shockey genealogical information.

SHOCKEY Family Reunion

The 1998 SHOCKEY Family reunion will be held July 2nd to the 5th at the AmeriHost Inn in Mineral Wells, WV. It is one of the newest hotel properties in the Mid-Ohio Valley. The AmeriHost Inn is located about 500 yards west of I-77 at Exit 170. See the enclosed map for approximate location.

Quoting from their letter:

"Your stay at AmeriHost Inn will include, for your convenience, a beautifully decorated room, in-room coffee maker, 25" TVs with remote, movies-on-demand, desk and modem hook-ups. Also, you will enjoy a spectacular indoor pool area, whirlpool, sauna and exercise room. Each morning we offer an expanded complementary continental breakfast in our breakfast room which overlooks the beautiful pool area."

"AmeriHost Inn of Mineral Wells offers to you a rate of \$49.00-Flat (1-4 persons per room) for each room. (These rooms offer a choice of 1 king size bed or 2 queen size beds.) We also offer whirlpool suites that include microwaves, refrigerator and complementary beverages and snacks. (Prices on these are \$70 to \$85 per night) Please check when making your reservation for the availability and rate if you wish to pamper yourself or that very important guest." The above prices do not include taxes.

Besides the dates listed above, anyone wishing to arrive earlier or stay a few days later, the same rate will apply. To get the special \$49 flat rate, reservations must be made by June 11th.

To make your reservations you need to call 1-304-489-3111. Calls to the AmeriHost 800 number do not get the special rates for the rooms. We have a total of thirty two (32) rooms blocked at the AmeriHost Inn with four (4) of these rooms being suites at the higher rates as listed above. First floor rooms and three handicap accessible rooms are available upon request with medical needs receiving priority. Second floor rooms do require the use of stairs.

The conference (or meeting) rooms are located on the first floor of the AmeriHost Inn. Be sure to bring your photograph albums of your Shockey family and ancestors.

Once the rooms at AmeriHost are filled, we have twenty rooms blocked at the Microtel Inn which is located one street below the AmeriHost Inn. The rooms at the Microtel Inn contain either one or two queen size beds and are available for a flat rate of \$41.95 plus tax per night.. (All rooms do have TVs with remote controls and air conditioning that actually works. The Microtel Inn opened the third week of February 1998.) First floor rooms and handicap rooms are also available upon request with medical needs receiving priority. Second floor rooms do require the use of stairs. Microtel Inn only offers coffee and tea available free each morning. They hope to be able to add doughnuts and bagels by July, but this is not a certainty. There is not a swimming pool at the Microtel Inn. Most major credit cards are accepted. Checks will be accepted only if sent in advance.

Reservations for Microtel Inn may be made by calling 1-304-489-3892 or 1-888-771-7171 and ask for the Mineral Wells Microtel Inn.

The block of rooms at Microtel Inn will be held until June 2nd and then released to the general public. After this date, if there are rooms still available, the special rate will still apply.

The Edgelawn Campground has agreed to block six to eight sites for those who wish to camp. This campground is located three (3) miles north of Mineral Wells. Use Exit 173 and go to the first stoplight on Rt. 95. Turn right at this stoplight onto Edgelawn St. The location is shown on the enclosed map. There is a choice of full service lots with water, sewer, electric and TV cable hookups. There are also some lots available for those not requiring a sewer hook up. Special group rates for the campground are \$10.00 per night. To reserve one of the campsites, you need to call 1-304-422-0103 by June 1st.



AIRLINES

For those of you wishing to come to the reunion by airplane, I hope the following information will help. The Parkersburg (PKB) airport is about eight (8) miles north of Mineral Wells. There is a larger airport at Charleston, WV (CRW) which is located about seventy (70) miles south of Mineral Wells.

For those coming from the West, Southwest or the South, the best rates are currently to fly into Columbus Ohio and take a commuter flight to Parkersburg (PKB). You may want to check with you airline for prices. At times it is cheaper to fly into Pittsburgh, PA and take a commuter flight from there.

For those flying from the Northeast, you should find direct flights to Parkersburg to be the lowest.

Both the Parkersburg and Charleston airports do have car rentals available. Parkersburg has both Hertz and National Car rentals and I believe that Charleston offers these as well as Avis.

TO DO AND SEE

One of the big attractions of the area is the beautiful and historic Blennerhassett Island. The mansion has been restored and many of the furnishings are from the original mansion and would have been there when Aaron Burr visited the Blennerhassetts. Civil War re-enactments are scheduled at various times throughout the year. Also in the area you can enjoy tours and shopping at the Middleton Doll Factories. Fenton Art Glass, Holl's Chocolates, the Oil and Gas Museums and many arts and crafts festivals held throughout the year, including the West Virginia State Arts and Crafts Fair at Cedar Lakes, just south of Ripley, which is held the first five (5) days of July each year. At this fair you can watch artists and craftsmen using skills that have been passed down for 100 to 150 years or more.

For the sports enthusiasts, there is bass fishing on the Ohio River and recreational water sports. There are six (6) championship golf courses within a 15 mile radius, and the area is home to the Frontier League of Baseball, the Ohio Valley Redcoats. Also, West Virginia Motor Speedway, a NASCAR approved auto racing track is nearby.

Plans for our formal events will start with the tour of Fenton Glass on Thursday afternoon. This will be limited to their annual big tent sale as the glass workers are given annual vacation the last week of June and the first week of July each year. Therefore it will not be possible to see the actual glass being made as Naomi had promised. This does not require reservations.

On Friday, shortly after noon, we will leave for Point Park where we have a sternwheeler with barge booked to take the group to Blennerhassett Island. Here you can visit the restored mansion of Harman Blennerhassett. He was a wealthy Irish aristocrat who settled on this wilderness island in 1798 and built a magnificent mansion and estate. However, he became entangled in a mysterious military enterprise with Aaron Burr in 1806. As a result, President Thomas Jefferson accused both men of treason in attempting to establish an empire in the Southwest. Blennerhassett fled the island. but was captured and put into the Virginia State Penitentiary. Although Burr was tried and acquitted and Blennerhassett was released from prison, the lives of both men were ruined.

Visitors to the island may enjoy a crafts village (unless closed due to the WV State Arts and Crafts Fair), refreshment and souvenir shops, picnic shelters and rental bicycles. Among the things to see on the island are the lush hardwood groves, long beaches and broad fields which provide the habitat for a large deer herd, throngs of water fowl and other birds.

A variety of options are available for touring the island. Costumed volunteers conduct tours through the re-constructed mansion. Self-guided walking tours and wagon rides behind teams of horses for a tour of the island are also available.

Price for the ride to and from the Island on the Ruble's Sternwheeler is \$7.00 per person, the mansion tour is \$3.00 per person, the wagon ride is \$3.50 per person and a tour of the Blennerhassett Museum located next to Point Park is \$1.00 per person.

Reservations for the Sternwheeler ride to the Island must be made 15 days in advance for the Shockey family to go to the Island as a group. Please send your reservations to:

Naomi Shockey, Rt. 2 Box 36-A, Sandyville, WV 25275 We need an exact count to determine which sternwheeler boat and barge will be needed. This will also allow tickets to be purchased in advance and eliminate standing in long lines waiting to purchase tickets.

On Saturday morning we plan a visit to the Stanleyville Cemetery in Washington County Ohio where Abraham (the 8th child of John Christopher) and his wife Margaret are buried and to the area where he spent the last years of his life. This tour, if time allows, will also include a trip into Jackson County to some of the areas that his descendants settled and the graveyards where many are buried. If we run short on time on Saturday, we will re-schedule the Jackson County trip to Sunday afternoon after the picnic and meeting or to Monday morning, depending on what the majority wants.

Anyone wanting to take in the annual Cedar Lakes Arts and Crafts Fair at Ripley should plan on arriving a day or two earlier. This is the largest Arts and Crafts Fair in the state of West Virginia and it takes a very full day to see most of the old arts and crafts being demonstrated. Cedar Lakes is about 44 miles south of Mineral Wells. All but 4 miles of this is Interstate driving on I-77..

Arrangements are under way to have the annual picnic catered by Kenny Rogers. It will be held at the Mineral Wells Grade School on Sunday afternoon. The school will be open from

noon to 4:00 PM with the meal planned to start at 1:00 PM. This will be followed by the annual meeting.

Kenny Rogers will cater the meal with a choice of two meats (roasted chicken and roast beef) and two side dishes, corn muffin, dessert and drink for \$7.50 per person and \$5.00 for children. They provide very generous servings and no one should leave hungry.

Naomi needs a fairly accurate count of the number of people who will be attending the Sunday picnic by June 26th to allow Kenny Rogers time to get the necessary amount of food ordered. An exact count is needed by July 3rd. This does not require payment in advance but it can be sent with payment for the sternwheeler ride if you so desire.

On display beside the grade school is an old one room school similar to the many that Jacob Shockey built in Jackson County. We are hoping that it can be open for tours.

SHOCKEY Genealogy

The SHOCKEY Family genealogy database continues to grow even if it is not growing as fast as some of us would like to see. Our largest gains in data have come as a result of finding "new" SHOCKEY cousins through the SHOCKEY Family mail list that we have on the RootsWeb server. The largest GEDCOM file that I have received contained 142 individuals. Others have not had as many new individuals to add to the database but many have contained more accurate information with corrections on dates and also dates for more events such as birth, death and marriage dates. There are several more of these "new" cousins that we have provided their missing links back to John Christopher Shockey that we are still waiting for their family group sheets or GEDCOMs to have to add to the master database.

In addition to those who we have been able to provide complete links to their ancestors, we have also had a few whose earliest SHOCKEY ancestor that they know of are not linking up with the families that we have. In many cases, it may just take one or two more generations to be able to link these cousins. Hopefully, as we keep gaining these new cousins, additional links will be made as new data shows up.

We have also received several new or updated family group sheets and these have added some new people to the database while others have added more details to existing SHOCKEY family members. There are still several who have promised updates in the past year or two that we have not yet received. Hopefully these people will find the time to complete the sheets and mail them in.

One of the better findings in the past year were the postings by Donna Porter and Donald Shockey within one week of each other of the following information: "According to the microfilms of the church records Evangelisch, Bega, Lippe, Germany, Johan Cord SCHACKE had the following children:

(1) Johan Christoffer SCHACKE was christened on 16 Jul 1723 in Evangelisch, Bega, Lippe, Germany. (2) Catharina Margreta SCHACKE was christened on 24 Dec 1724 in Evangelisch, Bega, Lippe, Germany. (3) Hans Henrich SCHACKE was christened on 14 Apr 1726 in Evangelisch, Bega, Lippe, Germany. (4) Anna Ilsabein SCHACKE was christened on 4 Nov 1731 in Evangelisch, Bega, Lippe, Germany. Germany.

This information appears to reinforce what Ernest THODE of Marietta OH, who is considered one of the leading historians and translators in the US of early German records told me in September 1996. The records that he showed me indicated that our Johan Christoffel SCHACKE was from Bega, Lippe, Germany.

On September 23, 1997 I discovered a web page created by Lowell M. Schake titled "THE SCHAKES OF LA CHARETTE which can be seen at the following URL: http://www.rootsweb.com/~mowarren/intro.html which tells of his SCHAKE ancestors. It is the story of the Johann Cord 'Kurt' Christoph Adolph Schake family and starts when he and Friederike Wilhelmine Kuhfuss were married on September 15, 1831 at the Evangelische Kirche von Bega in the country of Lippe in the Teutoburger Forest in Northwestern Germany. Later on November 2, 1855 they would arrive in America. (Please note the name and location.)

According to Lowell Schake's research, the spelling of this surname has varied from Schake, Schacke, Schacke, Schack to Schacke and perhaps Schaken over the past 300 years or more.

The following paragraph is from an email that Lowell sent to me as a response to my message inquiring as to the possibility of our ancestors being brothers.

"Lesley Great to hear from you and learn of your interest and the possible connection between our families. Believe me, we too wish the records went further back in time. I noticed that you feel your ancestor Johan Christoffel Schacke was born around 1715 and therefore do not believe it is the Johan Christoffer Schacke who was christened on 16 July 1723. I remembered that the Mormon Church IGI stated that this child was an infant (which we have been led to believe means he had died when a small child). We are not sure when Cord Heinrich Schake was born but we do have his death date and how old he was when he died. We believe he is probably the Hans Heinrich Schacke who was born in about 1726, son of Johann Cord Schake. Cord Heinrich was 78 when he died in 1804. We have not been able to find another child who would fit this from the Bega Church records for 1724-27. I don't know if there will be any way to prove this because the records in Bega are so bad back then. But normally they have 3-4 given names and the church records only show 2. But the fact that Cord Heinrich named his son Johan Cord makes me believe that this is probably true."

Work is still in progress trying to find the answers and we hope to some day be able to announce that we have proven that this was indeed our ancestor. Donna Porter has photocopied many of the pages of the church records referred to above. I am hoping to be able to meet with Ernest Thode and obtain his help in translating these early Germany Church records.

I would like to also mention that in addition to having Marie Shockey as a member of the Shockey Family discussion group, we also have Donald Shockey, author of "The SHOCKEY CHRONICLES". Others have also contributed answers from their years of research including Corrine Diller. Ken Shockey has scanned many more pictures and sent them to me by email to add to the SHOCKEY database. This includes scanning many photo images that he had provided before in TIFF format into JPG format as Family Origins no longer supports the TIFF format. The JPG format does result in a considerable savings in space on the hard drives. I have also received a few images from other

members of the mail list. Anyone who has the ability to scan their SHOCKEY photos is welcome to send the images to me by email or on floppy or zip disks.

I did not accomplish as much as I had hoped for do to my very busy schedule and a major lightning strike Sept. 20, 1997 that wiped out two computers as well as several thousand dollars worth of other items in and around the house. We are still trying to get some items fixed.

Minutes of Annual General Meeting
Shockeysville, Virginia
July 6, 1997

- 1. With the ringing of the church bell, President John C. Shockey called the Meeting to order at 1:43 PM. Approximately 92 people were in attendance. A copy of the agenda is attached.
- 2. Howard Shockey offered the blessing. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Jarred Huff.
- 3. The President read the names of those Shockeys and descendents who had died during the year. Other names were added from the floor. Prayers were said and a moment of silence observed in their memory.
- 4. Howard Shockey read the Minutes of the 1996 Meeting, which were approved as read.
- 5. The President provided a status report on the purchase of 5 acres of land adjacent to the church property, and outlined the terms of the purchase agreement signed with the seller, Dr. Brill, in the total amount of \$13,750. A copy of the agreement is attached. Marie Shockey gave a financial update on expenses and donations to date, in which \$5000 had been paid to Dr. Brill, \$500 had been paid for the survey, and \$199.20 had been paid to the attorney. Another \$5000 payment is due on or before March 31, 1998, and the final payment of \$3750 is due on or before December 31, 1998. About \$7500 has been donated so far, prior to the Reunion, and about \$1800 remains in the account. The President made an appeal for donations or pledges now, since there will not be another meeting, nor an opportunity for an appeal in the Newsletter before the next \$5000 payment is due on March 31. In response to a question on the planned use for the property, the President stated that such an acquisition as a memorial to all the Shockeys long had been one of our goals. He mentioned the posibility of an appropriate Marker, with a " Time Capsule", in which could be deposited our Corporation Charter and By Laws, and other records, and some listing of those who had contributed to the purchase of the land. It would be available for other uses and functions as may be developed in the future.
- 6. Daniel N. Shockey reported that his audit of the Financial Records found all to be in order. Further, in the absence of Sue Dexheimer, Treasurer, he read the Treasurer's Report, dated June 23, 1997, copy attached. It was noted that there was a cash balance of \$943.38, and that about \$500 more had been expended during the year than had been taken in. The Report was accepted as read. The President read Sue's letter of resignation as Director and Treasurer, effective at the end of today's Meeting, with great sorrow, and noted that we were indebted to her for her fine service over many years.
- 7. Daniel N. Shockey presented a slate of Officers and Directors proposed by the Board of Directors. The slate was approved and declared elected by show of hands, as follows:

John C. Shockey, Penn., President Daniel N. Shockey, Va., Vice President and Treasurer Helen See, Az., Secretary Francis Shockey, Va., Registered State Representative Howard Shockey, Ill., Chaplain Marie Shockey, W.Va., Newsletter Editor/Genealogist Leslie Shockey, W.Va., Computer Genealogist James "Bud" Roseberry, Idaho, Computer Genealogist John D. Shockey, Ohio Nora Seitz, Cal., Walda Ann Paris, Mo. Gerald Shockey, Tx. Scott Luttrell. Va.

All of the above were present and introduced, except Nora Seitz, and Walda Paris.

- 8. Marie Shockey gave a Report on the Newsletter. Some 2200 copies had been printed and mailed, at a cost of \$2099.02. \$604 had been received in donations, leaving a balance of cost over donations of \$1495.02, which the Board had agreed to reimburse.
- 9. Les Shockey and Bud Roseberry gave an update on their activities. Some 2200 names have been added to their files. About 350 pictures on hand will be added to the data base when the scanner is operational. Some 96 Megabytes of data now is on file. They urged all to review and update their records. They reported that there now is a Shockey Family Discussion Group on the internet.
- 10. Scott Luttrell gave a Report on the Shockeysville Church. He noted that landscaping and maintenance work are in progress. Overall, they are doing well. He noted that Margaret Shockey Dunn had taken action to transfer 5 acres to the Church, with the land being adjacent to Church property and the land the Fellowship is buying.
- 11. Leslie and Naomi Shockey invited the Group to the Parkersburg, W. Va. area for the Reunion next year. They outlined various activities and sights which may be of interest. Their invitation was accepted. The Reunion will be held on July 3,4 and 5, 1998. Details will be provided in the Newsletter.
- 12. The President reported on the tour of the Oakland, W. Va area conducted on Saturday, 5 July, 1997, and outlined plans for a tour in Maryland and Pennsylvania scheduled for Monday, 7 July, 1997, including Waynesboro, Ringold and Penn Mar. Points of interest would be Christopher Shockey's farm, Shank's Mill, Shockey Station, Harbough Church, Valentine's Cave and nearby places. A show of hands indicated there would be many in attendance.
