

- 2- Brittany Paris, granddaughter of John Waldo Shockey, led the Pledge of Allegiance followed by a prayer by Howard Shockey.
- 3. John C. Shockey read the names of those deceased in the past year and a moment of silence was observed in their memory.
- 4. Helen See, Secretary, read the minutes of the 1998 meeting which were approved as read.
- 5. Daniel Shockey reported that the Books had been audited and were found to be in good order.
- 6.John D. Shockey gave the Treasurers report. It was noted that the balance was \$1,400.97. The report was accepted as read. He asked members to identify themselves by number and name when sending dues. He spoke of the need for \$1,700.00 to repay those who had loaned money to finalize the purchase of the property.

- 13. Rev. Isaac Luttrell gave the closing prayer and the meeting was adjourned at 2:46 pm.







Shockey Genealogy

Once again it is time to start making our reunion plans. It does not seem that it could have been one year since I prepared the last article for the annual newsletter. It will only be four months before we will be packing all of the equipment and heading to another reunion. Naomi and I are looking forward to seeing the many friends and relatives from the past reunions and hope to meet many new ones at the 2000 reunion.

The number of members on the Shockey Family mail list at RootsWeb has remained almost the same with eighty eight people currently subscribed compared to eighty six last year. This includes at least six members of the board of directors. The activity on the list is still not as high as hoped. If anyone has ideas or suggestions that might help increase the research activities on the list, please let us know. There is so much that could be done to further the research of our Shockey ancestors. One example is that there are 598 listings with the surname SHOCKEY in the RootsWeb's WorldConnect Project. It would be great to be able to check each of these to see if a link could be made to the Shockeys that we have in our database. I have taken the time to check out about twenty of these over the past few months. I have been able to make the connection in eleven or twelve out of the twenty that I have checked so far. I then contact the person who has submitted the family tree offering the information that we have on their ancestors in exchange for them providing information on the descendants of the Shockey(s) that they have. I also tell them about our annual newsletter, the annual reunion and the Shockey Family Fellowship, Inc. and the Shockey mail list at RootsWeb. Most will then join the mail list and send their address in order to receive the newsletter. I really enjoy find these new Shockey cousins in this manner and regret that my work schedule does not allow for spending more time checking for more of the missing Shockey cousins.

In addition to the many Family Trees that have been uploaded at RootsWeb's WorldConnect Project, there are also many others that are being posted to sites at LDS, Ancestry.com and GenForum among others. Taking the time to check each of the various genealogy sites for possible relatives and then writing to the person who submitted the data would be a full time job for several people. Anyone interested in spending some time searching some of these for more of our missing Shockey cousins can contact me for more information by any of the following methods:

We have had two incidents that I am aware of where individuals have obtained information from members of the Shockey Family Fellowship, Inc. in one manner or another, removed any source information and then posted the information on web pages. In both cases they have failed to follow net etiquette and remove birth dates and places on living people. One of these I became aware of when a 2nd cousin wrote telling me how much he appreciated all the genealogy data that he had found that one of my daughters had posted. (This daughter has never posted any genealogy data on the Internet.) The second case involves an individual whose only Shockey connection is that he had a 5th great grandfather who had a brother and a sister marry Shockeys. I had refused to provide this person with a copy of the Shockey database after he stated that once it was in his possession that he had the right to do with it anything that he wanted. He then did get a copy of it from another member of our group and published it to three different Internet sites. His only interest is in being able to brag as to how many people he has listed in his family tree, even when the people are not related to him. This person refuses to remove data on living people.

We need to be able to share genealogy information or we would get nowhere with our

genealogy research. I feel that it is very important that we respect the copyright of others and that we do not publish personal data on living individuals without their consent.

Shockey Family Genealogy Page on WWW

The Shockey Family Genealogy Page has been on the RootsWeb server for over one year now. In addition to the boards using the GenConnect system, we also have eighty one snapshots and photos from the 1999 reunion and links to the pages that Ken Shockey has created including the Shockeysville Church page, the Ringgold tour, the Oakland tour and various photos that he has taken. The GenConnect boards include Queries (39 posted), Obituaries (13 posted), Bible Records (1 posted), Wills (1 posted), Deeds, Biographies and Pensions. The titles for these boards should make it clear as to what each board is to be used for. It is important that if you see something in a Will or Obituary or any other board that you have a question about, then post the query on the Queries Board only. Queries posted on the other boards will have to be removed.

If you have material to post on any of the boards, please take the time to list the surnames that are listed in the document including the SHOCKEY surname. Surnames are to be listed in the proper area one surname on each line and without any punctuation being added in this area. These surnames will then be available by the powerful search engine and easy to find by anyone using the GenConnect system. As examples, if a Bible Record or Will contains the names Shockey, Harbaugh, Kemp, etc., then anyone visiting the GenConnect system and does a search for any of these surnames, they will be able to find the article quickly. Hopefully, when we have several articles posted to these boards, it will enable other "lost" cousins to find us and add to the material as well as help to locate more of our SHOCKEY cousins.

It is really simple and easy to use the above listed boards. If you want to save online time, you can easily have you document that you want to add open in another program and then copy and

paste to place it into the form. After you have the information entered, I suggest that you use the preview features to see how it is going to look before posting to the page. If you need to do any editing, then click on the edit button. Once you have it looking and reading the way you want the article to look, then click the submit button.

Hopefully each of you have some records that can be posted and will help others find the genealogy information that they have been searching for. The more that we can make our research visible, the easier it will be for other relatives to find us.

If you will be attending the annual Shockey reunion, now would be a good time to check for photographs and documents to bring to the reunion for scanning or having digital copies made to add to the genealogy database. Also be sure to fill out updated family group sheets to share to help bring the database up to date.

Anyone who does not have family group sheets to work with can write to Marie, Bud or me and we will gladly send some forms for you to use. You can also pick up these form at any LDS Church Family History Center. I think that they charge five cents per sheet for these.

If you have your genealogy information on a computer, then think about making a GEDCOM file and bringing with you on a disk or make some copies of printouts and bring them with you. It would help if you would bring at least two copies if possible, but we can make copies if needed. Several cousins did bring either GEDCOM files on disk or updated family group sheets to the 1999 reunion and I have spent most of my free time getting these added to the master database.

With the new Family Origins 8.03 it is much easier than ever to merge data from GEDCOMs on disk (or submitted by e-mail) than ever before. A new feature has been added called "drag and drop". It allows the user to have two databases open at the same time. You then click on the name of a person in one database that you want to move to the other database, drag it over to the

other database window and release the mouse button. You are then ask if you want to move just the individual, or the person with all of their ancestors or all of their descendants. Be sure to write down the name of the person that you want to link to or merge with to avoid having to search for them once the move is made. The trick is to make your selection in such a way as not to have to merge more than one or two individuals after moving the data.

If you have Internet access and e-mail, you can subscribe to the Shockey Family mail list by sending an e-mail to:

SHOCKEY-L-request@RootsWeb.com with just the one word --> subscribe

in the text area. Turn off any automatic signatures to prevent possible problems in subscribing.

The mailing list is intended primarily for genealogy research relating to the ancestors and descendants of John Christopher Shockey but can also be used for announcements of interest to our Shockey cousins.

It appeared in Abraham Christopher Shockey's Bible along with his name and birth date and his first wife Rachel Chestina Haney's birth date, marriage date, and death date. The Bible was purchased about 1865 to replace the family Bible that had been destroyed.

Abraham is the eldest son of John Valentine Shockey of Clearfield County PA. He was born in 1847 in/near Curwensville, Clearfield County and died in 1926 in New Kensington, Westmoreland County PA.




bride. "But she convinced me he would learn to play right-handed, and I would be OK."

ANOTHER NAME ON THE VIETNAM WALL:

I heard something about this story two or three years ago, but I didn't know how to get in touch with the persons concerned—and still don't. The person who told me had read something about it in a newspaper. I was reminded of it recently and I thought it was something you would all like to know about.

A young man named Robert Shockey was a soldier who served in the Vietnam War. While Leading his squad through the South Vietnamese Jungle, they came upon a Vietnamese Command Post. Snipers fired on the Americans, but Robert Shockey ignored the danger and went on ahead to find out the extent of the bunker system. He found much valuable information which he gave to his Company Commander. He continued his search until a land mine exploded and almost killed him. He was hospitalized and remained in a coma for more than a year. He died on 7 December 1967, just two days after his 23rd birthday. He never knew that he was a hero, that he had been awarded the Purple Heart and the Bronze Star, or that his wife had given him a son, Robert Shockey Jr. His little daughter was only two when he left home.

When Robert Shockey Jr. was a junior in High School, he was doing research on the Vietnam Memorial for a school project. He checked the list for his father, but it was missing. There were 58,000 names and he thought it might just be a mistake, but when he saw the Traveling Replica of the Wall, he found that it was still missing.

When he told his sister, Roberta, she just couldn't believe it!

The War had taken him from his family and he gave his life in the service of his country, what more did it take? They had no idea what to do first, the wall was more than 3,000 miles away.

They contacted every government agency they could think of, with no results. Then, for years they just gave up. No one would tell them how to get their father's name added to the Wall.

Finally, in 1994, they began contacting offices again, including The Battle Monument Commission, The National Park Service and in 1995 they reached Tom Ellis, the army leaison to the Vietnam Vet's Memorial. He told them that they had to get Robert Shockey's medical records to see if he was eligible. That took nine more months. Ellis sent the required paperwork to the Department of Defense.

I think it was in 1997 when his name was finally added. I think that was when his daughter was trying to raise enough money to get herself and her two children to Washington, DC to see his name on the Memorial. I hope she made it.

When we were in Washington on the Bus Tour last year, we found a Robert L. Shockey on the Wall. It don't show very plain and it may not be "him", but I hope it is.

she said, smiling, "but I'd never tell him that."

Drexel Chemical had just dabbled in international sales when Leigh Shockey arrived with her college training in Spanish, Portuguese and

French.

She began to look for distributors, first in Latin America, to sell Drexel's 250 products, which include pesticides, herbicides, growth regulators and micro-nutrients. The company's first foreign distributor was in Costa Rica.

Drexel now sells in 80 coun-

tries.

"I didn't really have a program when I started," Shockey said. "Dad lets people run with a project, which I think is a great way to lead."

There were challenges.

Drexel was a small company, without a lot of money to spend on developing markets. As a generic producer, with no bigname labels, Drexel had to compete on price as well as quality. The company had to learn to rework its packaging and labels to each country's specifications and language.

There were cultural differ-

ences to overcome, too.

"I would get faxes to Mr. Leigh Shockey, and I never corrected them," Shockey recalled. "By the time they found out I was female, they knew I knew what I was talking about."

A distributor from Sudan did not realize Shockey was a woman until she met his plane

at the Memphis airport.

"He told me, 'In my country, a woman's place is in the home.' I told him, 'I'm sorry, but I'm all you've got,' "Shockey related.

William H. Morris, chairman, of the international consulting firm Global Associates, said Shockey's ability created her success.

"She has managed to be extremely successful in an industry dominated by men," Morris said. "She's done it with her knowledge and engaging personality." 21-

In 1984, Robert Shockey sold Drexel Chemical to the Swedish company Kema Novel. He bought it back in 1990, when Kema Novel decided to exit the pesticide business.

Leigh spent those six years establishing and running her own international marketing firm and trading company, IDA Inc. She still owns the chemical portion of the company.

"The minute my father bought Drexel back, I came

back to run the international side," she said.

Shockey's office, decorated with family photos and her son's artwork, is at Drexel headquarters and distribution center on Presidents Island. The company has plants on Pennsylvania in Memphis, in Tunica, Miss., and Cordele, Ga.

About 70 of Drexel's 200 employees work in Memphis.

A small window is built into the wall separating her office from her father's, and Shockey uses it to make the point that "he's still here, he's still the leader and I have a lot to learn from him."

The transfer of responsibility, she said, "makes a statement that we intend to stay in business. We're one of the few independent agricultural chemical companies left, and there were a lot of questions about what Dad would do when he turned 65."

Despite a consolidating industry and offers to buy Drexel ("They weren't good enough," Leigh said, smiling), the family has no intention of selling the company.

Leigh's ascension to the top job was so natural it seemed like evolution, said Robert

Shockey.

"Leigh has a broad understanding of the entire business," he said. "She has experi-

ence and knowledge"

The strengths of his younger daughter, Leslie, lie in other areas, including plant science, Shockey said. "Together, they make a good team because their talents are different and complementary," he said.

Leigh Shockey's interest in international business extends beyond her own company. She is chairman of the Tennessee District Export Council, a Commerce Department appointment.

"DEC members serve as mentors to novice exporters and give grass-roots input into trade policy questions," explained Ree Russell, director of the U.S. Department of Commerce Export Assistance Center in Memphis. "We also target them as speakers for seminars and workshops.

"Leigh brings energy and enthusiasm and vision to the DEC," Russell said. "She's an excellent speaker. She's very committed to international

trade and the globalization of business."

It was for those qualities also that CBU's Centre for Global Enterprise tapped Shockey as the first chairman of its new

advisory group.

"She will lead the work of the advisory board, which is to advise the Centre about its programs and make suggestions of how to work better with the business community," said Centre director Peter Stromberg.

"When I first saw Leigh," IP's Flenorl recalled, "a lightning bolt came to mind. She's a petite woman who streaked

"And I respect her community involvement, how she fits

it all in," Flenorl said.

Shockey fits it all in by knowing when to retreat, she said.
"I am fairly extroverted. But

even though I love people, I have learned I need to be in a close circle of family and friends to re-energize," she

said. "Spending weekends on the farm does that for me."

Shockey, now divorced, said she also leaned on women in the group. She was in the Class of 1990, served as president in 1993-95 and still is active.

"The organization really flourished under Leigh's leadership," said the group's executive director, Elliott McNiel.

What Shockey remembers, however, is being newly pregnant and running her own business when she joined Tennessee Leadership. "I was scared to death, and in a male-dominated business, there was no one to fall back on. Those women, all working and many with families, were so supportive and encouraging. One wonderful thing about women—when they have challenges, they can still laugh and joke."

Frederick County resident Scott Luttrell is devoting much of his life to researching his ancestry.

Luttrell, 47 and a Stephenson resident, has collected 10,000 names of Luttrell descendants and has 1,200 pages of information filed away.

"I've got 3,000 names of Luttrells who are alive now." said Scott Luttrell, as he sat at his dining room table, which is piled high with books, scrapbooks, papers, and photographs.

"And, I've done it all the hard way, without a computer. It took me a whole winter just to put all the documents I've collected into

plastic folders."

Many of his findings will be boxed up this weekend and taken to the Winchester-Frederick County Conservation Club, off U.S. 522 North, near Gainesboro, where the Luttrell clan will meet on Sunday, Aug. 8, for its 79th family reunion.

Luttrell, who said reunions are always held on the second Sunday in August, was named the family's historian at the 1990 re-

"I've been studying Luttrell history for 35 years. Since I've started doing this, I've helped about 300 people with research, not including

my own family."

Through his research, Luttrell has traced the family back to France in 1066 and has discovered that his ancestors had two castles -Dunster Castle in England and Luttrellstown Castle in Ireland, near Dublin on the Liffey River.

"My ancestors are from Ireland," Luttrell said.

In 1740, Leroy, Richard, and James Luttrell came to Virginia from Ireland and settled in Fauquier County.

The family stayed in that

area, Luttrell said, until about 1786.

Richard Luttrell's children, Robert, Fielding, and James, migrated west and settled in the Gainesboro area of Frederick County.

"I'm a descendent of Robert," Luttrell said.

Leroy's and James' descendants went south, Luttrell said. "Some settled in Richmond, and the rest went to Tennessee."

According to another Luttrell descendent, Allie Kipps, of Sunnyside, the Luttrell reunion is traced back to a combination reunion and a

birthday party in 1920 for Kipps' father, Thomas Edward Luttrell, and her uncle, Isaac Howard Luttrell.

The event, Kipps said, was held in Collinsville, between Cross Junction and Shockeysville.

"A lot of people came to the party, and it was there that my mother (Mary Luttrell) and my aunt (Inez Luttrell) decided to have a reunion the next year,"

Kipps said. "And it's continued since then."

Most of those early reunions were held in Collinsville, Kipps said.

"We also met a few times in Shockeysville and once or twice in Berkeley Springs, W.Va.," she said.

For several years, the family had a two-day event, Saturday and Sunday, said Kipps' 88-year-old sister, Hilda Luttrell, who has attend-

ed all but one reunion. "On Saturday it was in Collinsville and on Sunday at Shockeysville United Methodist Church," Hilda Luttrell said.

"It got too much for the women to cook two big dinners, that's why they cut it back to one day on Sundavs."

Hilda Luttrell, who lives north of Winchester on Martinsburg Pike, also remembers when a "huckster would come to the reunions and sell ice cream and peanuts and things like that.".

The reunions moved to the conservation club about 15 years ago, said June Shifflett, another Frederick County resident and Luttrell descendent.

Scott Luttrell said he didn't attend the reunions regularly until the event was moved to the conservation club.

"I've attended all of them since they were moved to the conservation club, and now most of my brothers and sisters go."

Luttrell's parents, Harry and Annabell, are deceased. He has nine brothers and eight sisters. All but one sister is living and all but one of his siblings lives in the area.

According to Luttrell, more than 250 people attend the annual event.

"We invite anyone who's a Luttrell descendent or who thinks they might be to come to the reunion and give and share information," Luttrell said.

"People have a good time." Although people will start gathering to look at materials and old photos at about 10 a.m. on Sunday, the reunion won't officially start until 12:30 p.m. with a business meeting, lead by the reunion president, Donald Taylor of Winchester.


June Shifflett, secretary, and Fran Luttrell treasurer.



Some additional comments about my dad:

John Robert Shockey was a direct descendent of JOHN, son of Christopher. His great great grandfather, Jacob Shockey came to Ohio thru Marietta, Ohio in the early 1800's. They settled in Vinton County, part of Athens County at that time. The early Shockeys and especially Jacob are mentioned favorably in a book published in 1886, The History of the Hocking Valley. Looking at the descendency from the top down, Jacob was a gr grandson of CHRISTOPHER.

Dad was the second 'John' of five consecutive generations. Dad was married in 1931 to my mother, as stated in the obituary. They attended several of our national reunions including Grove City, Ohio, Shockeyville and Kirksville, Missouri. He always enjoyed visiting with the many friends that he made at the reunions, including John C. and Jane, Dan and Dot, Ralph and Marie, and others whose names I cannot recall. He was really into the Shockey Family and I remember the first trip that Ralph made to Columbus. Dad insisted that he and I drive out to the West Side and meet Ralph. They really hit it off well from the very beginning.

Dad was a pretty good musician as were many of the Shockeys in this line. Dad was a good piano player and I remember most of our family 'get togethers' and reunions, usually ended with music. Dad and his Aunt Harriet (Shockey) Albright played double on piano, his brother Lawrence and cousin Eugene Shockey played violins. The rest either sang or listened. Some of their music was classical music and some was old time stuff like 'She'l be Comin Roun the Mount'n', 'Turkey in the Straw' and 'Orange Blossom Special'. Their music ability came naturally because they were all descendents of the Shockey Brothers Band members from McArthur (Vinton Co), Ohio. This band was second in band competition at the St Louis World Fair in the early 1900's, Small Town Bands Class. It is said that they were pretty put out about the second place, refused their trophy and came on home. Dad's father, John F. Shockey played in this band.

Dad also was active in the New Albany community. He was a member of the volunteer fire department, the N.A. Lions Club, N.A. Band Boosters and the New Albany Athletic Boosters. He and other athletic boosters were active in reviving a football program in 1948 which had been absent for 16 years. They sold 'athletic bonds' to finance the purchase of uniforms and equipment, and the second year, install lights on the home field.
