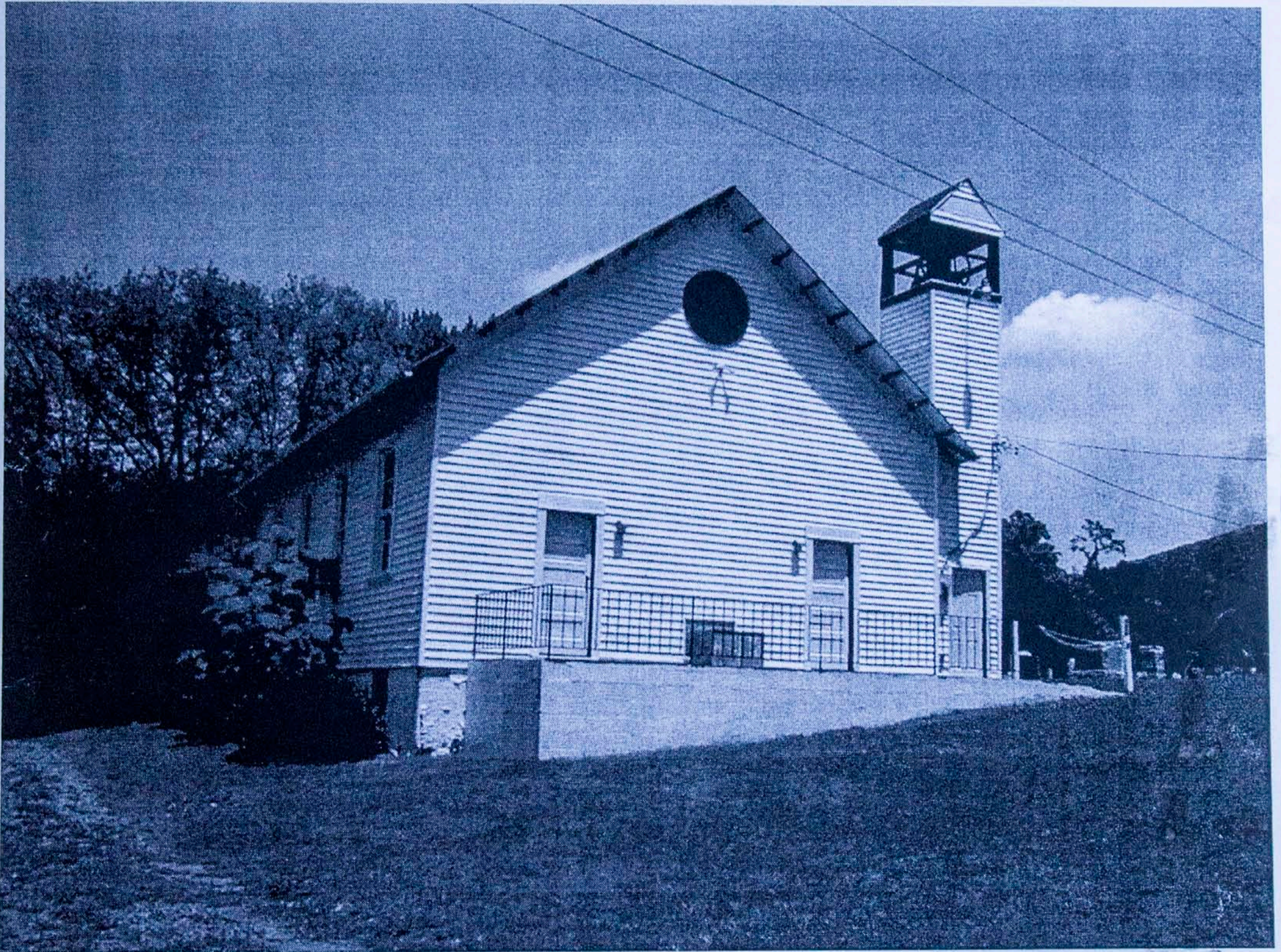

Dear Friends and Shockey Cousins,

I usually have the newsletter finished by this time, but as I get older, I seem to put things off.

This has not been the greatest year for me. I had back surgery in October and lost one of my sisters in December. She wasn't just a sister, she was my best friend. The back surgery was a huge success. The loss of my sister is a different story.

I am most grateful for your cards, letters and contributions to the newsletter. I didn't receive many articles of interest to include this year. I am sorry about that. I always enjoyed the interesting stories you sent in and I know many others do too,

It is time to make plans for the Annual **Shockey Family Reunion**. It will be held in Winchester, Virginia on July 3rd through 7th. Some of us wanted it to be in Denver, but we got voted down this time.

I have reserved 30 rooms at the **Holiday Inn Express Hotel and Suites** on the north side of town. If you come in on route 522, you go through 5 lights and it is there on your right. If you come in on I 81, take the route 37 bypass and you can't miss it. A map will be included. The cost is \$75.00 plus tax. Suites are a bit more. The Hotel is only about two years old. Each room has a microwave, coffee maker, iron and ironing board. They include a free hot cooked deluxe continental breakfast. There is an indoor pool and exercise facility. Local phone calls are free and they have 24 hour coffee and tea service.

The Conference Room is a nice size and located just around the corner from the lobby. It will be available all day Friday, Saturday and Sunday except for times when we may close long enough to go to lunch or dinner. Most of the time, someone stays there.

For reservations, call **1-540-667-7050**. Be sure to tell them it is for the **Shockey Family Reunion**. They have a few handicap rooms and I think some of the rooms may allow smoking. Some of the rooms have king size beds and some have two queen size. I am not sure how many of each, but we are all in the same section. Make your reservations early to insure your choice of rooms. You must make your reservations a month in advance in order to get the group rate.

The Motel is located just behind Sheetz, Kentucky Fried Chicken and Arby's. Across the road is the Venice Italian Restaurant, McDonalds, Starbucks and Subway. There are two large Supermarkets nearby. Wall Mart is about half a mile and so is Applebees. I don't recommend Applebees because every time I go there they serve me cold food. I will provide directions to: Red Lobster, Olive Garden, TGI Friday's, Cracker Barrel, Golden Corral and others. There is shopping in the area where the restaurants are.

On Friday, July 4th, we will be in the Conference room all day to answer any or your questions, help with your genealogy research, add new information to our data base. Bring any pictures or family information that you would like added. If you don't know how you fit it, we take care of that too.

On Saturday, we offer a tour of Shockeyville and John Shockey's cabin in Oakland for any one who has never seen this area. If we have enough people, we have lunch across from the church. Scott Luttrell brings things to make sandwiches and also lemonade and ice tea. There is no charge, but we make a donation to the church.

On Sunday, we will attend services at Shockeyville Church and have a catered picnic lunch about 12:30. We leave the Motel about 9:15 and church service is at 10:00. Rev. Isaac Luttrell only preaches at Shockeyville now, so he will have more time to sing gospel songs and visit with you.

After lunch we have our general meeting. There will be plenty of time to take pictures and a group picture in front of the church.

On Monday we offer the Maryland/Pennsylvania Tour where John Christopher Shockey lived and where many Shockeys still remain in the area. The tour is very interesting and historic. We had a slight problem with it last time but this year it will be just fine.

For those not interested in genealogy or have extra time to spend, Winchester has several historic sites. There will be brochures in the Motel that you can pick up. Berkeley Springs is only 35 miles and it has a number of antique shops, craft shops, an antique mall, a real castle and a spa that is not very expensive. The mineral waters from the spring are 73 degrees the year round and are said to cure all sorts of things. It is said that the Indians came there to take the waters for their arthritis and that George Washington came there often. There is a 'tub' hewn out of rock that is said to be George Washington's bath tub. All of this is in the park right in the center of town. I wanted to offer a Bus Trip to D.C. to see all of the monuments, but I can't do it on Friday because D.C. is a traffic nightmare that day and the rest of the time is taken up with genealogy and related tours. We will see that you don't get bored, I promise.

The reunion last year was held in Mineral Wells, West Virginia and hosted by Les and Naomi Shockey. We had a nice place to stay and Sunday lunch was held in the Hotel dining room. The food was delicious.

They offered a number of interesting things to do. We took a Bus trip into Ohio's Amish country: Sugar Creek and Walnut Creek. We visited Heini's Cheese Factory, an Amish bakery and a hardware store. Lunch was at Der Dutchman. The food was great and the portions were more than generous. Naomi forgot to tell us that there was a Coldwater Creek Outlet Warehouse near the motel. We went there too.

It was so nice to meet the new cousins and get to know them. For years, they have just been names on my mailing list. I do hope that they will all come back this year so that we can show them where their ancestors actually lived. It is much better than just reading about it and we can share all of the new and exciting things we plan to do in our future research.

It has taken many years to collect all of this information. I don't remember exactly when research began, but I do know that a lot of dedicated, unselfish people have spent countless hours, driven thousands of miles and spent an untold amount of money to get where we are today. The task is never finished. A lot of new and exciting information is uncovered each year. Les and Bud are retired so they spend most of their time on genealogy. I think Gerald still works, so he doesn't have as much time to devote to research. They will all be at the reunion and will be pleased to share information with you, find where you fit in, add information and any pictures you may have that you would like to have included. There are a number of connections that are still kind of "fuzzy". It is quite possible that one of you could have the key that would tie it all together. Les will tell you how we plan to address that problem.

Last year we added three new members to the Board of Directors. They are John L. Shockey from Arkansas, Ralph Shockey from Frederick, Maryland and William Shockey from Mt. Airy, Maryland. All of them have attended reunions before.

We appreciate all of your donations toward the newsletter. Each year the cost of printing and mailing increases. I am sure that I am way short this year. I realize that the economy is a miserable mess, but somehow, we have to keep the newsletter going.

Last year the cost was as follows: Bulk Mail Permit was \$160.00. Print 1,500 newsletters \$1,998.10. Cost to mail 1427 at bulk rate and 13 to Canada, \$452.00. Returns: 53 @ 70 each \$37.10 (That doesn't add up, but that is what they charged). Mail extra newsletters and other related material, \$21,77. The total cost was \$2,668.97.

Direct donations : \$\$2,058.00, leaving \$ \$610.97 due to me. I was reimbursed from the treasury.

We do sell T-shirts and caps to help raise money and collect dues. We often have extra expense for the reunion such as the conference room and there are times when we don't have the required number for the catered lunch and have to make up the difference to the caterer. For instance, if the quoted price is to serve 75 and only 60 show up, we are charged the difference. We have to pay taxes on the property at Shockeyville and other fees related to our organization.

I know that Les has explained all about the DNA testing that we are very excited about. It is about the greatest thing that we can do to make sure that the research we have is correct. Our goal is to get several male descendents from each of the original Shockey sons to take the test. It is real simple to do and would be a wonderful contribution to the Shockey History.

Unfortunately, if they are descended from a female Shockey, it doesn't work the same. Men and women just happen to be different. It is not all that expensive. Every person that has done any genealogy research will spend way more than the cost of a DNA test and think nothing of it. We need this information to be certain that we have you connected to the proper Shockey Son of John Christopher Shockey. There are several instances in our research where we are not 100% certain that we have some folks connected to the correct ancestor. I would do it in a heart-beat, but I wasn't born a Shockey, I married one. Give this some real serious thought—PLEASE.

4. David L. Shockey read the memoriam for those cousins who passed away during the past year.

David F. Shockey asked that we remember John C. Shockey, who passed away this year. He was the past President and active participant of the Shockey Family Memorial Fellowship for over 25 years. He contributed a great deal to our organization and will certainly be missed.

5. Donna P. Shockey read the minutes of the 2006 General Meeting. Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the minutes as read.
6. Donna J. Porter presented the Treasurer's Report. The ending balance as of May 31, 2007 was \$2,661.34 (copy attached). Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the Treasurer's Report.

7. Marie Shockey presented the Newsletter Report. (Report Attached) 1,500 Newsletters were printed and 1,440 Newsletters were mailed out. Total cost for the Newsletters was \$2,668.97 and donations for the Newsletter were \$2,058.00. Amount due to Marie for her out of pocket expenses for the Newsletter and T-Shirts is: \$661.37. Marie added that all donations were greatly appreciated and also requested all change of addresses be sent to her. She pays extra money when they are returned. Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the Newsletter Report and to reimburse Marie \$661.37.

8. Genealogist Reports:

Lesley Shockey:

* Received a letter from Reverend Guenter Stopka, Germany (letter attached). His ancestors are on many of the lists acquired.

* Discussed new information he received that descendents go back to Switzerland. Will provide the article in next year's newsletter and will send an e-mail to those on the e-mail list. (e-mail attached)

* For the past several years, he has had requests to access the genealogy data. He has tried working with CD's but encountered problems, with several not being able to access them on their home computers. There is the possibility of putting the genealogy information on-line. There is space on Roots Web to post. Information would **not** be posted on those still living. Vital information would be posted only on those who are deceased. If anyone sees any changes that need to be made, please let Les know.

* Added 750-800 new names to the database and also made many corrections.

* Discussed family members taking part in a DNA project. Would like to have at least one male descendent (two would be better) volunteer from each of the original six sons of John Christopher. The cost is approximately \$125 (basic) to \$400 +. He will also contact some cousins in Switzerland and Germany. John Christopher was born in Germany and his father and grandfather were born in Switzerland.

David F. Shockey mentioned that a working group had been formed to gather and provide information on the DNA testing to those who might be interested in participating. The working group consists of Donna J. Porter, Les Shockey, Bud Roseberry, Marie Shockey, and Ralph Shockey.

Bud Roseberry: Reminder to get data submitted to him.

Gerald Shockey: Continues to work on the data base and keeping the information up to date.

Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the Genealogy Report.

9. Marie Shockey presented the Shockeyville Church Report in the absence of Scott Luttrell.

Shockeyville Church has pulled away from the Methodist Church. Members of the Shockeyville Church wanted to stick to the Bible teachings. A foundation has been set up to take care of the church and property; \$20,000.00 is currently in the fund. Any donations to the fund would be appreciated and can be made out to Shockeyville Church. Since making this change, the membership has increased and there is now a children's and adult Sunday School. Anyone who wants to use the 5 acres next to the church for camping, etc., should get in touch with Scott. Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the Church Report.

11. New Business: David F. Shockey presented the proposed changes in the board members as follows:

John C. Shockey (position vacated by death). Walda Ann Paris (Missouri) and Ken Shockey (Pennsylvania) moved to Inactive Directors.

Daniel Shockey (last year requested he be removed as a Board Member/Vice President/Virginia State Representative). Will be moved to Inactive Director position. We greatly appreciate all the contributions to the organization that Dan has made and wish he and his wife, Dottie, the best.

Motion made, seconded, and approved to elect Gerald Shockey as Vice President.

Motion made, seconded, and approved to elect Scott Luttrell the official Virginia State Representative.


Motion made, seconded, and approved to move Walda Ann Paris and Ken Shockey to Inactive Directors.

SHOCKEY Genealogy

Hello SHOCKEY cousins. Another year has passed by ever so quickly. Work continues on the SHOCKEY database. It would likely go much quicker if some of those who have offered to help would only have done so instead of taking what we have completed and then placing it on line as their research. At least some of those doing this are soliciting materials be sent to them instead of the SHOCKEY Family Fellowship. This helps their database grow but takes away from the SHOCKEY Family Association. Some of these individuals are taking copyright material from this newsletter and publishing it on the web as their research including too much information on living people. The work that we are doing and the information that is being provided is intended to assist other SHOCKEY family members with their own research, not for the personal gain of a few individuals. Removing sources or changing the name of the source of the material does not help the SHOCKEY family nor does it help the individual who is searching for their family.

I am still limited as to the amount of time that I can sit at the computer doing the needed work on the family genealogy but I do enjoy finding new cousins and making advances in researching the family. I am still finding family groups that have been submitted as descendants of two different sons of John Christopher SHOCKEY and it takes a good deal of effort to straighten out.

The most exciting part for me was to be able to announce to those who attended the 2007 SHOCKEY Family reunion a major breakthrough in our research. With Ernest Thode helping me translate, I have found the birthplace and date of Johann Christoffel SCHACKE. Johann was born 8 June 1720 in Kirchheimbolanden, Pfalz, Bayern, Germany to Jacob and Johanna Elisabetha SCHACKE. Jacob was listed as a Master Ropemaker and a Councilman and as a Swiss in the records. The proof that this is our John Christopher SHOCKEY is that in 1749 Christopher SHOCKEY mailed a letter from Philadelphia to the officials in Bern Switzerland giving up his rights to the Swiss citizenship that he had inherited from his parents. With a noted German researcher sharing the results of some of his findings with me, I believe that I now know who his grandparents and great grandparents are but am still waiting for positive proof. If we do not get this any other way, hopefully the SHOCKEY DNA Project that we have now started will provide the proof on these additional ancestors. I believe them to be Christians and Elsbeth JAGGI and Hans and Barbli JACOB.

SHOCKEY DNA Project

The SHOCKEY DNA Project is now under way. All necessary steps were completed and set up through Family Tree DNA on February 22, 2008. Marie SHOCKEY and I are both very excited about what all is offered by having the DNA testing.

We are hoping to have Y-DNA37 37 Marker tests submitted by at least one male direct descendant (son of a son of a son, etc.) from each of Johann Christoffel's sons. Tests from two descendants of each of the sons would provide even better guaranteed accuracy.

The purpose of the SHOCKEY DNA project is to:

- assist in identifying descendants of Johann Christoffel SCHACKE, AKA John Christopher SHOCKEY.
- Prove or disprove certain theories regarding some descendant lines that have been questioned.
- Determine if some with variant spellings such as SHAWKEY, SHOCKLEY and SCHOKEY are actually descendants of Johann Christoffel SCHACKE, AKA, John Christopher SHOCKEY.
- Prove the origins of Johann Christoffel SCHACKE and his ancestors.
- Prove or disprove the theory that some persons with the SHOCKEY surname are descendants of the SHOCKEY Indian tribe.

Males can join:

- A Surname Project that research individuals that have the same surname or a variant. Joining a Surname Project could be very helpful to verify relationships with individuals that share a similar surname.
- One Y-DNA Geographical Project to verify a possible point of origin for the paternal line.

Females and Males can join:

- One mtDNA Lineage Project that research individuals that have or suspect having the same maternal line.
- One mtDNA Geographical Project to verify a possible point of origin for the maternal line.

The normal cost for the Y-DNA37: 37 Markers Test is \$259 plus postage. For those who are part of the Project the cost of the **37 Marker Y-DNA test \$189 + \$2 postage**. The regular cost of the Y-DNA67 Marker test is \$349 plus postage but as a part of the project the cost is **\$269 + \$2 postage**.

When ordering a test kit, you can pay for the test kit by credit card or you can request that they send an invoice with the kit.

The Family Tree DNA test kit consists of two or three sets of cheek scrapers and collection tubes --designed for a single persons use. Each tube contains a fluid designed to arrest bacteria growth, so you can scrape your cheek and return your kit in any type of weather (hot or cold). The freshness of your sample will remain intact for months. Full details of the test kit can be seen on the following page.

2007 SHOCKEY Family Reunion

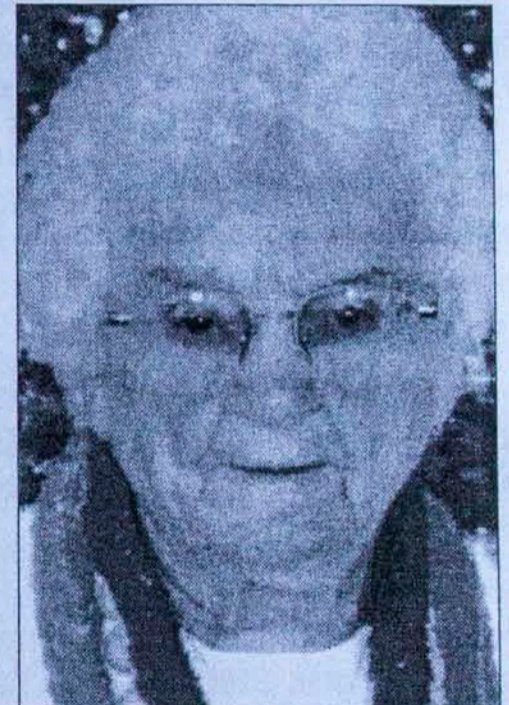

He was active in the St. Francis Episcopal Church of Pauma Valley as well as Rancho Community Christian Church in Temecula.

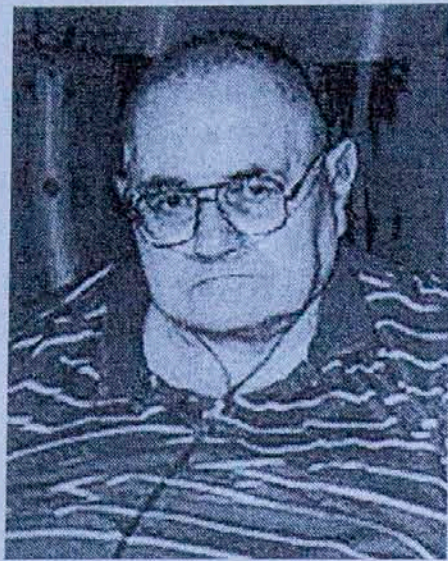

My Grandfather / My Hero

My grandfather should be this year's "Veteran Entrepreneur of the Year" because he exhibits all the qualities that make me proud to be an American and his grandsonqualities that make me proud to be an American and his grandson.

My grandfather joined the army when he was 17 years old. I am not sure he really knew what he was getting himself into because before that time, he had never been anywhere outside Wolfe County, Kentucky. I do believe, however, that he was looking for an adventure and he certainly found one. He spent time in Germany and at 19 he volunteered to go to Korea.

I think the training my grandfather got in the Army has been paramount to his success in business today. His superiors obviously had the management skills necessary to instill the much needed discipline I am certain my

grandfather needed without breaking his spirit. He learned from them to be fair but firm and to lead by example while never misusing that position of power. Thus, they gained his respect and motivated him to surpass his own expectations.

From his comrades, he learned to appreciate the strength of diversity. Living and working in close quarters with a variety of men allowed him to understand, firsthand, the heart and mind of individuals he might have, in another place and time, found no connection with. By understanding their background, their culture and their life experiences, his perspective and assumptions changed as did his value for each individual's uniqueness.

At the same time, he discovered many areas of common ground among his fellow soldiers including a love of country and freedom. One of the most valuable lessons I learned on putting diversity in perspective came from my grandfather's story of being injured while out on patrol one evening in Korea. He stepped on a land mine which blew his foot off and riddled his body with shrapnel. He lay there for hours while going in and out of consciousness and questioning as to whether he was dead or alive.

Eventually, my grandfather was rescued by another soldier who picked him up and carried him out of enemy territory back to his unit. What he did not mention, in previous accounts, was that his rescuer was African American. When I asked my grandfather why he had never mentioned that before, he looked puzzled and replied, "Why would it matter?" I thought about it for a moment and realized it did not. His rescuer was simply, at that moment, another American comrade fighting for a common cause and belief. Nothing else mattered.

Today my grandfather runs a business that is known and respected throughout the world. He is determined, tenacious and a true motivator of people. He never falters in the face of adversity; always believing that justice will prevail. He sees a blessing in some of the most unlikely predicaments and always gives of his time and money to those less fortunate and/or struggling. Those are qualities I believe he developed while an American soldier.

He wears his purple heart with pride and that ever-so-slight limp in his walk never slows him down or prevents him from pressing on. There is no one I admire more and there is no one that makes me more proud to be an American. I wear his name with pride and I only hope I live to be half the man and entrepreneur he is. I believe if you meet him, you too will be proud.

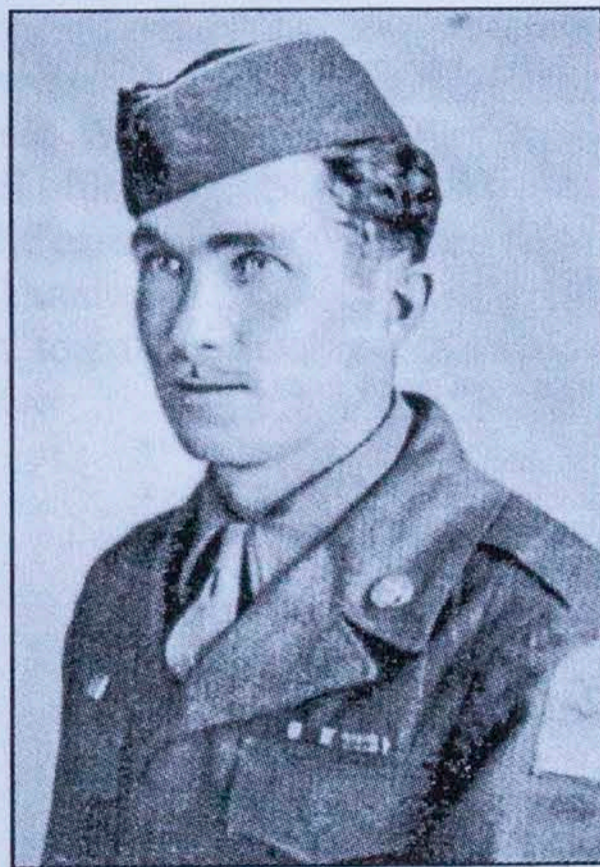
She was preceded in death by her husband and her parents.

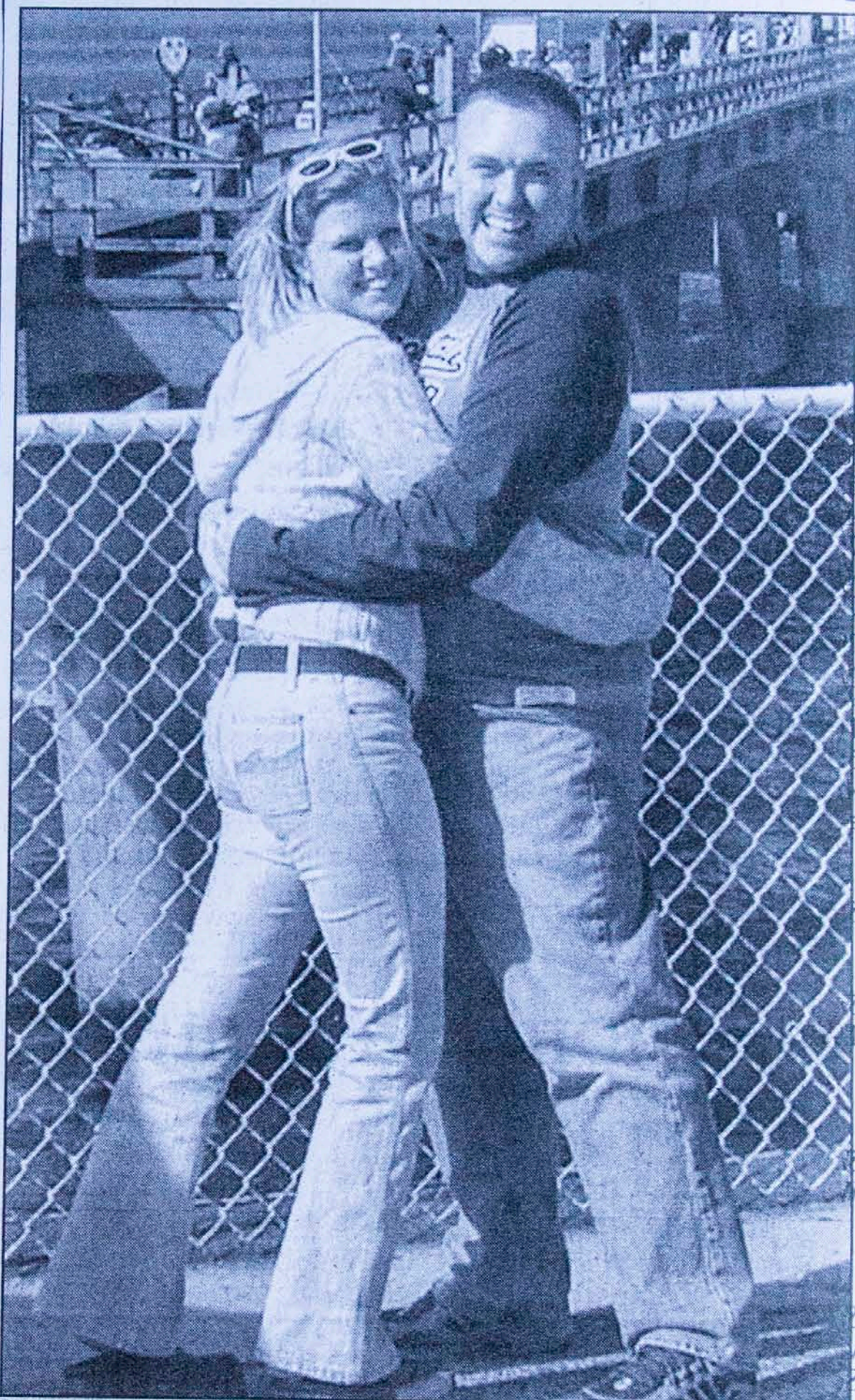
Mr. and Mrs. Albert Roy Shockey Sr. of Winchester have been married for 30 years.

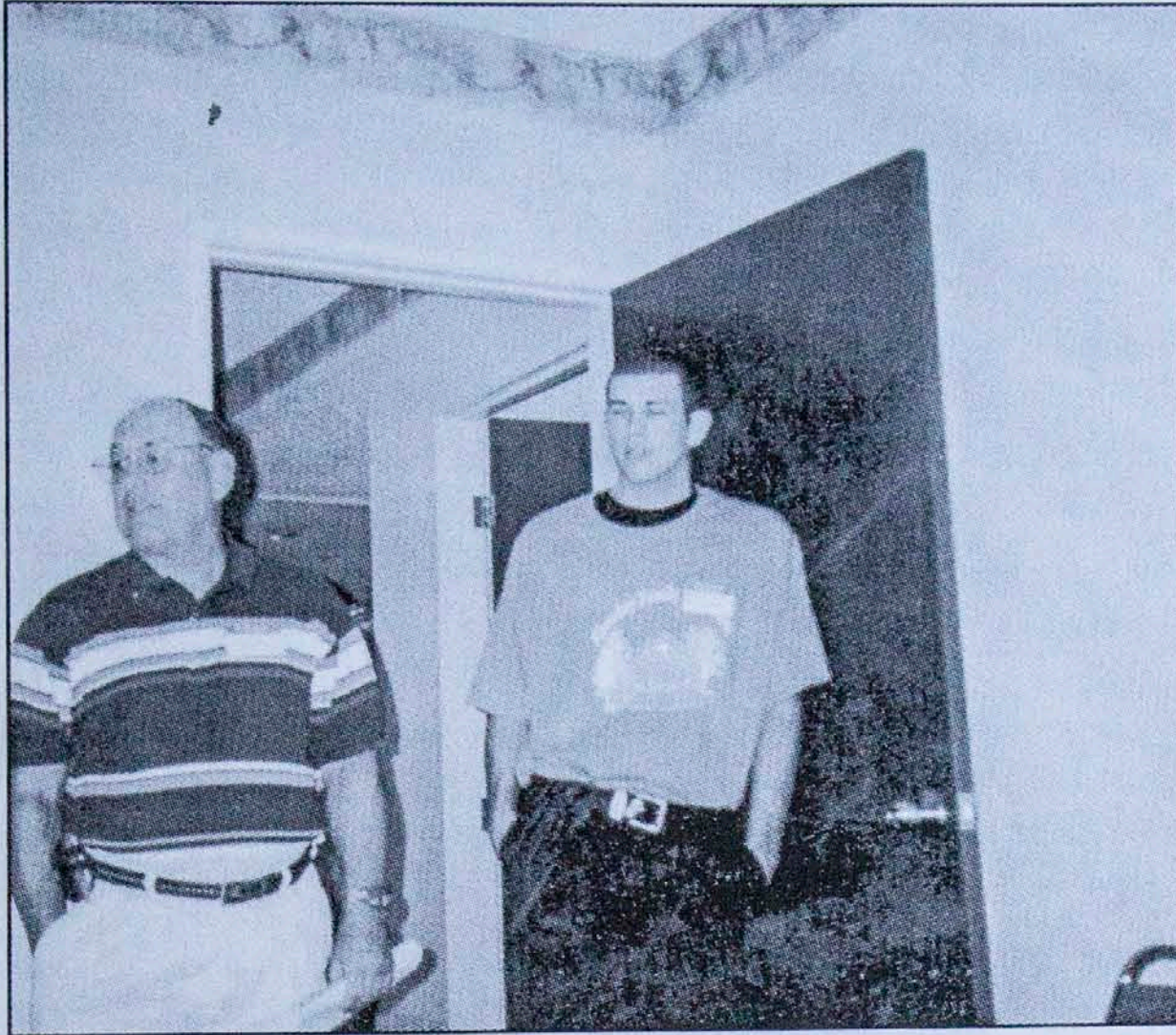

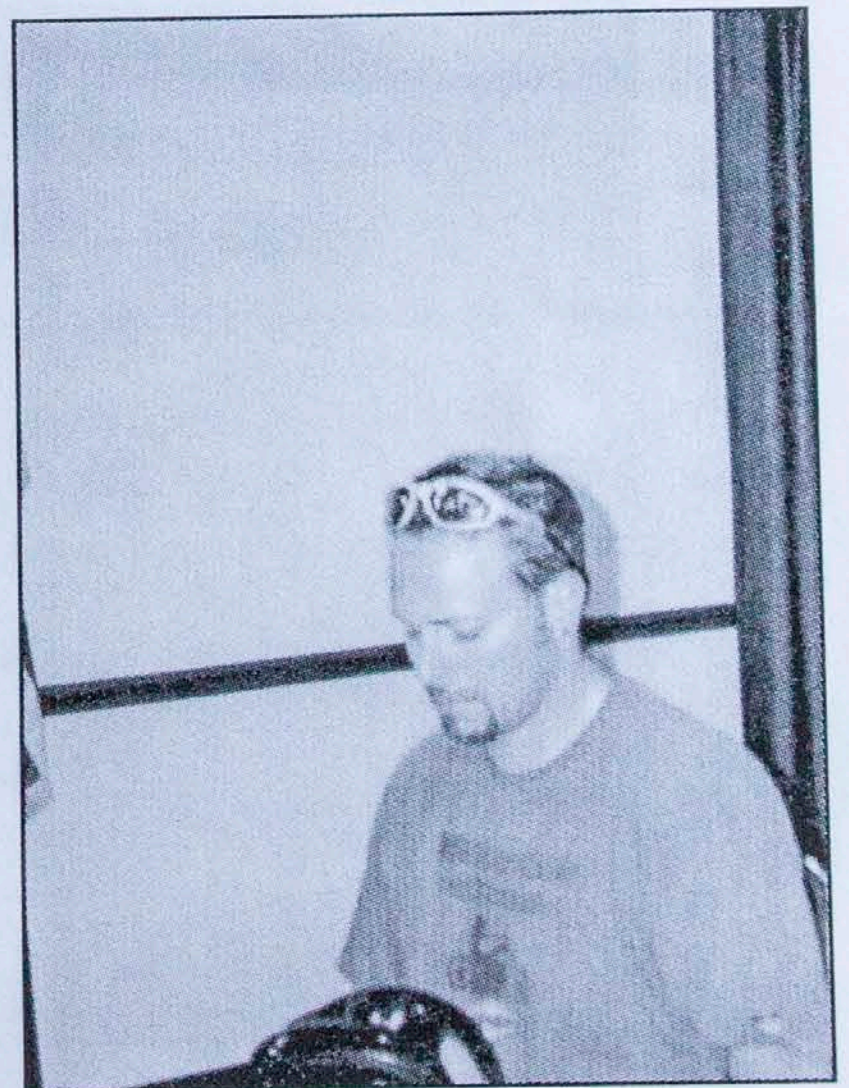


Above: David Shockey, President, of Rineyville, KY,. Introducing new board member, William Shockey, Mt Airy, MD. William is our youngest board member, age 22.

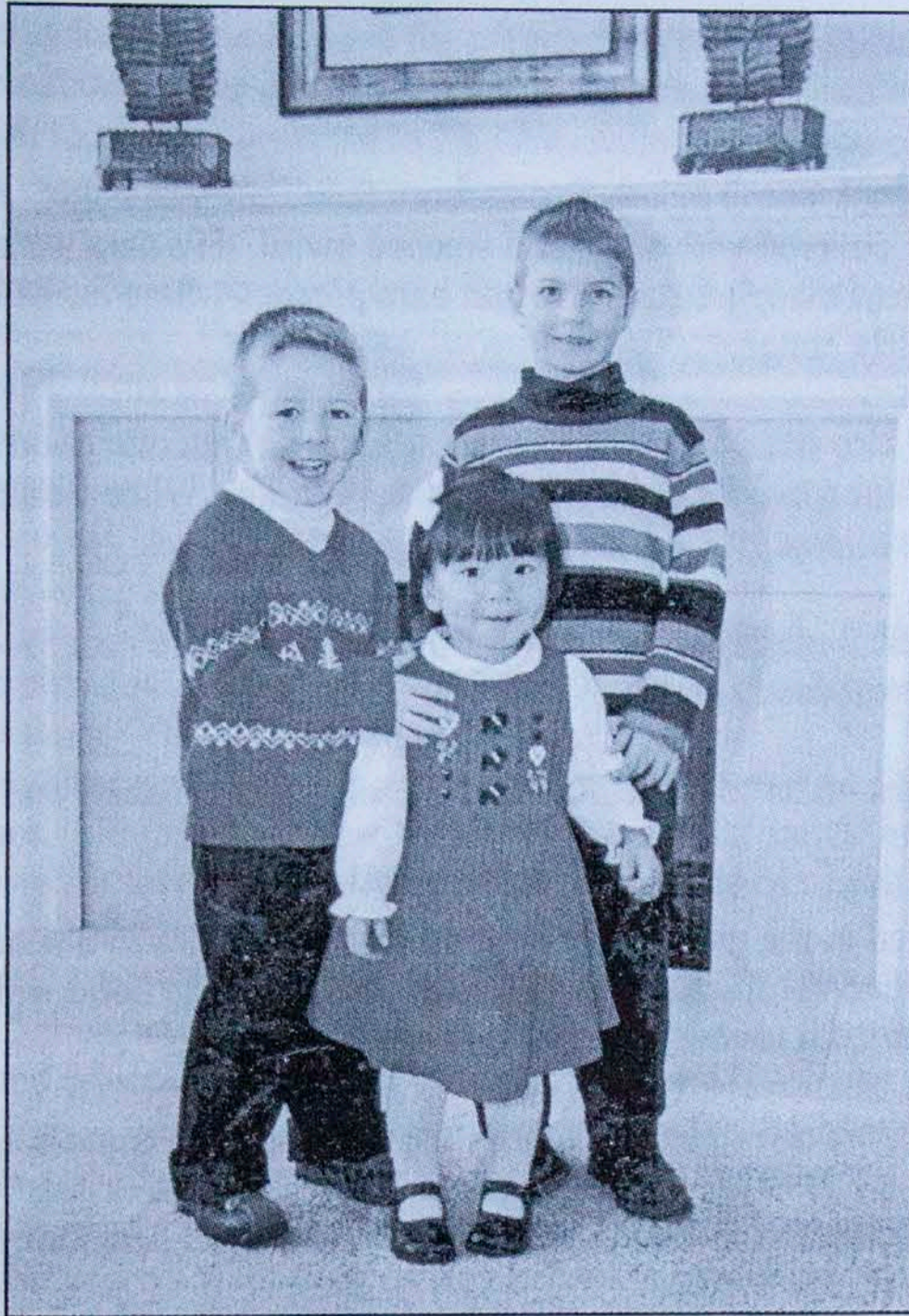

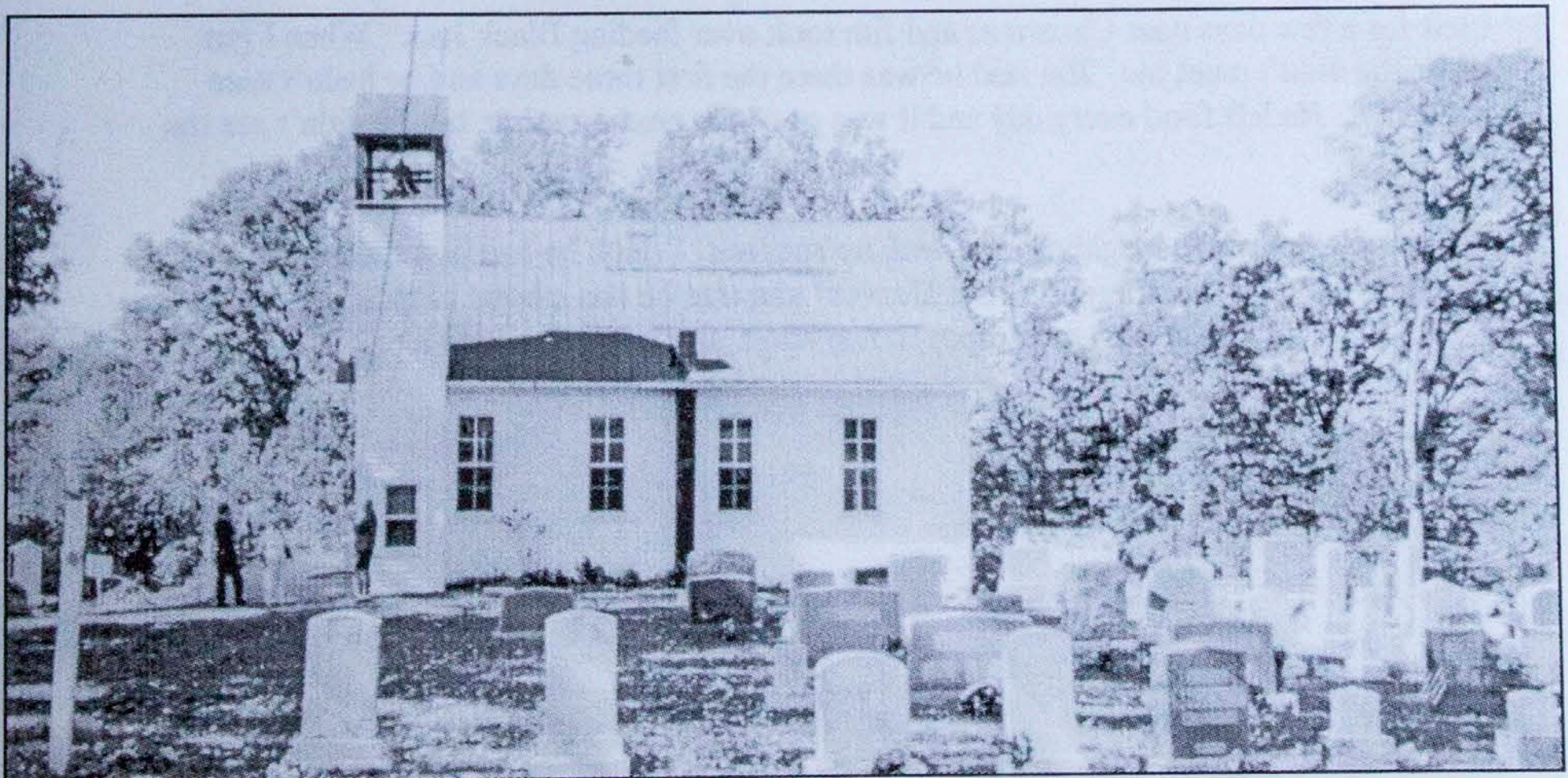
