Dear Friends and Shockey Cousins,

It is time to start planning for the 2010 Shockey Reunion. It is hard to think 'July' when I look out my window at about 50 inches of snow and more is on the way. This has not been a great Winter. We have only had services at Shockeysville Church twice since Thanksgiving and Winter is not over yet. Around Christmas I was snowed in for 8 days straight and after a few days of freedom, I got dumped on again. I didn't get to mail my Christmas cards. Sorry about that, but Christmas wishes don't mean much when it is already into the next year. This mess ain't been fun.

I thoroughly enjoy the cards, letters and phone calls I receive from you all during the year and we appreciate all of the donations for the newsletter. We have less to work with each year as many of our generous supporters have passed away. I can't thank each of you personally, but you have my gratitude and the gratitude of everyone who receives and enjoys the newsletter.

The 2010 Reunion will be held in Winchester and Shockeysville, Virginia on July 1st through July 5th. I have reserved rooms at the Holiday Inn Express Hotel and Suites on the north side of town. It is the same place where we stayed in 2008. The rooms are \$75.00 plus tax, the same as they were two years ago. You have a choice of rooms with a king size bed or two queen size. The suites cost a little more. If you have a choice or need a handicap room, you need to make your reservation early. The number to call is:

1-540-667-7050. Be sure to specify Shockey Family Reunion. Cut-off date is June 17th. The hotel is easy to find. If you come in on Rt.522, you go through 5 lights and it is there on your right. If you come in on I-81, take the Rt.37 bypass to Rt 522 and it is right there behind Sheetz, Arby's and Kentucky Fried Chicken.

The hotel offers free deluxe Continental Breakfast, inside pool, exercise facility and free coffee and tea is available at all times. We have the use of the Conference Room all of the time we are there. The computers will be set up by Friday morning and we will be there to welcome you, visit with you and share genealogy. Be sure to bring all of your additions and up-dates. Pictures would be nice too.

There are lots of nice places to eat. The Venice Restaurant is just across the street and I will provide directions to Cracker Barrel, Olive Garden, TGI Friday's, Red Lobster and others. There is a large Supermarket, Starbucks, McDonalds and Subway right across the street and WalMart is less than a mile. Even the Hospital is only about a mile away, but I hope we don't need to go there. A map to the motel will be included.

On Saturday we offer a tour to Oakland where John Shockey's cabin stands and to the Oakland Cemetery. This is an important part of Shockey History. We end the tour at Shockeysville about lunch time. Scott Luttrell usually provides sandwiches, iced tea and lemonade.

On Sunday we attend services at Shockeysville Church. We will leave the motel at 9:15 and church services begin at 10:00. Rev Isaac Luttrell will bring the message and then he and his wife, Diane, play and sing gospel songs which is thoroughly enjoyed by all. After services we have a picnic lunch and the General Meeting when we let you know what we have been doing during the past year and what we plan in the future and

decide where the next reunion will be held. At this point, I am not sure if the meeting is before or after lunch. We try to keep everyone there until we can take a group picture in front of the Church

I usually had the lunch catered, but the gentleman who owned the company has retired and we simply can't afford the others that are available. The last two years David and Donna and I have done our own catering and it has worked out just fine. We can still do it for \$10,00 per person and my two handsome grandsons have promised to do the serving. One is a manager for Burger King and the other one is the cook at a Nursing Home, so they are well qualified. The food will be picked up on Sunday morning and there are refrigerators at Shockeysville if we need to use them.

On Monday we offer the Maryland/Pennsylvania tour. Les conducted it last time and will have a lot of the history to tell you this time about the places an people who lived there. He went to that area and did some exploring on his own since the last tour. It is so amazing to look down over the 1820 acres that actually belonged to John Christopher Shockey and you will see the exact spot where Valentine's cabin stood and where Shockey Station was located. I have a picture of Shockey Station as it once looked. I will bring that picture to the reunion so everyone can see it.

For those not interested in genealogy, there are a number of historic places to see in Winchester and the surrounding area. I would recommend Berkeley Springs, but last time I sent folks there, the antique shops were closed. The Spa and the Park are quite interesting and we do have a real Castle that is usually open to visitors. If you want a Bus Trip to D.C., let me know. If enough people respond, I will get it arranged. I would need to know by May 1st.

The 2009 Reunion was held in Colorado Springs, Colorado, July 2nd through 5th. There were so many wonderful things to do and see that we had to make our own choices and fit them in between the other things that we had to do. The thing that we did as a group was the Flying W Ranch Dinner and Show. Everyone seemed to enjoy it. We met some new cousins and hope they will continue to participate. And while on the subject of participation, I need items for the newsletter. David F. Shockey, President, opened the meeting and welcomed everyone in attendance.

Howard Shockey led the opening prayer.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by the group and everyone stood quietly for the ringing of Aunt Maggie's bell. Howard Shockey read a memorial prayer in remembrance of those Shockey cousins who had passed on this last year.

David F. Shockey introduced the board members who were present. Those in attendance introduced themselves and told where they traveled from. The states represented this year were Idaho, West Virginia, Texas, Arkansas, Ohio, Illinois, Missouri, Washington, Colorado, Iowa, Maryland, Oklahoma, Arizona, and Kentucky.

Donna P. Shockey read the minutes of the 2008 meeting. Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the minutes as read.

Treasury Report: Donna J. Porter presented the report (copy attached). The ending balance as of June 30, 2009 was \$1,932.39.

David F. Shockey explained the two tax bills for the past year – property tax of \$204.00 was for the 5 acres the Shockeys own. The time capsule was placed on this property in 2000. The Incorporation Tax of \$35.00 is paid to the state of Virginia.

Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the Treasury Report.

Newsletter Report: Marie Shockey presented the report (copy attached). The total cost for the newsletters to be printed and mailed was \$2,630.43. Donations for the newsletter were \$1,688.50. Additional reunion T-shirts were purchased at a cost of \$198.45. The amount due to Marie for out-of- pocket expenses was \$1,140.38.

Motion was made and seconded to approve the Newsletter Report and to reimburse Marie \$1,140.38.

Marie reminded everyone to send her changes of address and also the names of those who would like to receive a copy of the newsletter. She asked folks to send her interesting/informative notes or articles about their family so she can include them in the newsletter. Anything sent would be helpful and appreciated.

Genealogy Report: Les Shockey reported he had 10-15 names that were dropped off the Roots Web Shockey e-mail list, leaving about 110 names still on this list. The Shockey database includes 18,932 individual names, 6,694 families. and 475 family photos.

DNA Update: 19 members signed up for the DNA testing; 11 of these are true Shockey male descendants, 3 carry the surname from their mothers. One name, Baysinger (which was traced to an area in Switzerland), matches very closely to the Shockey name. Many thanks to Nancy Shockey for helping to research the information. Currently looking for male descendants of Jacob and Samuel Christian (the son from the second marriage) to be tested. Family Tree has a special offer for 67 and 37 markers through the end of July 09.

Bud Roseberry reported that he continues to rebuild his database.

Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the Genealogy Report.

<u>Church Report:</u> Marie Shockey presented the Church Report in the absence of Scott Luttrell. The church is financially sound, all the bills have been paid and there is money for repairs. The Memorial Fund currently has about \$30,000. The Sunday attendance has increased from about 12 people to 20-30 each Sunday. If anyone is in the area and would like to see the church, call Marie or Scott and they will take you inside.

Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the Church Report.

Old Business:

David F. Shockey led the discussion on future reunion sites. Several years ago, the decision was made to have the reunion every other year in Shockeysville. The years in between would be in various locations. The future schedule is as follows:

Mr. Bill Erickson invited our group to attend a memorial and his family's reunion in Washington in 2010. Rather than make any changes to our current reunion schedule, it was decided to offer support and include information in next year's newsletter about Mr. Erickson's family reunion. Everyone is invited to attend.

New Business:

David Shockey thanked Naomi Shockey and Tiffany Shockey Futrell for setting up the lunch tables. He also thanked everyone for all their donations for the newsletter as these costs continue to rise; thanks for sending in membership dues, and thanks for any donations to the Shockeysville Church Memorial Fund. SHOCKEY Genealogy

As we are settling into a winter that has been much colder and with quite a bit more snow than we have seen since back in the early 1990s. I have been busier than normal bringing in firewood, loading the stove and clearing the snow from the driveway and sidewalks. I decided that I should perhaps get an earlier start on my articles for the newsletter so that I will be ready when Marie says its that time once again. Seems it comes quicker each year.

I have been working on additions and corrections to the SHOCKEY database. As always any new additions or corrections to the database are greatly appreciated. I am still waiting for several additions an updates that have been promised in the last year or two. There are a very large number of Shockey cousins out there that are not listed in our database nor either the red books or the green ones.

I have not made any more progress on the ancestors of John Christopher Shockey. I know that his parents, grandparents and great grandparents were all Swiss citizens with their birth records being found in Lenk and Sankt Stephan, Switzerland. I thought that one of our Shockey cousins was going to send me some photos of the Kirchheimbolanden, Pfalz, Bayern, Germany area that I could include in the database and newsletter but they never arrived..


Last March, about the time that the annual newsletter was placed in the mail, my youngest brother and I made the 300 mile trip east to Rouzerville and Ringgold area in an attempt to locate the exact location of John Christopher's cabin. Thanks to Landon Shockey for providing me with the text from a page of the diary or journal of Mason and Dixon in which they described visiting Staphel Shockey's



house and gave the exact survey measurements to it from the nearest survey marker, pictured below.

The marker was originally three feet tall but the years have taken a toll. That is my handheld DeLorme GPS lying on top of the marker in the previous photo.

This is the 96 mile marker and the cabin is listed as 3 chains west and 7 chains north. Using a compass and 100 foot tapes we made the best measurements possible while crossing the ditches and roadway. The corner of the farmhouse caused an error of several feet as we could not measure directly through it. Below is a photo of the




probable cabin site but I have been unable to locate the current owner(s) of the farm to see if they can provide confirmation that this was the old cabin site.

If you look closely you will see that I am holding one of the small stones that mark the border to this plot. Plans are to include this as a stop on this years tour of Ringgold, Rouzerville and PenMar area on Monday, July 5th, the last day of this years reunion..

The next item mentioned in the journal is also of interest to the Shockey's. "Went to a cave near the Mountain about 6 miles south of Mr. Shockey's. The entrance is an arch about 6 yards in length and four feet in height, when immediately there opens a room 45 yards in length and 40 in breath and seven or eight in height with not one pillar to support nature's arch. From this room is a narrow passage about 100 yards in length at the end of which runs a fine river of water. There are other rooms on the sides along this passage..

On the tour in 2008 Ken Shockey showed us a barn that was owned by one of the Shockeys at Rouzerville. They had recently discovered that the barn was supposed to have been used as a part of the underground railroad during the Civil War. They were in the process of restoring the old barn when the discovery was made.



Hopefully more information has been uncovered that can be shared this year.

This photo was taken looking south toward the Mason Dixon Line from the spot where we measured to be 7 chains north. Notice the tape running toward the corner of the house. Also notice the light colored spot in the grass which is the location in the photo shown on the previous page. That spot is about 30 feet south and 7 feet east of where we had measured..

SHOCKEY DNA Project

The SHOCKEY DNA Project has been a part of the Family Tree DNA test group for just over two years now. Test results have proven very interesting and Marie and I are both pleased that we now have proof that she was correct in some of her conclusions based on the research that she and Ralph had worked on for years. Even though there have been some that questioned some of the seven children of Isaac and Jane Shockey, DNA testing proves that Daniel, the youngest son who stayed in Virginia with his mother when Isaac took the older children and moved to Kentucky was indeed a Shockey.

Males who carry the bloodlines from John Christopher belong to the Haplogroup Q. These are all most likely in the Q1b subclade (which is quite rare in comparison to other groups) but only three of the group have had the additional test to prove this. All three who have tested were found to be Q1b type.

We have twenty one members in the **Shockey** DNA Project now. Of these fourteen men are in the Q Haplogroup and thirteen of these have unbroken male

Shockey bloodlines back to John Christopher Shockey. There has been several results that prove that most of us descend from one common ancestor within the last six to nine generations but there were three or four surprises including the discovery of another surname where the DNA is close to ours but the surname is not.

Most important we have four who have tested and matched perfect 67 out of 67 markers. There is one descendant from Valentine, one from Abraham, one from Isaac and one from Christian Christopher. There is one other who only tested 37 markers but is a perfect match in the first 37 markers to the above four.

There are four of us who matched 66 out of 67 markers, one a descendant of Abraham one from Valentine, one from Isaac and one from John Aaron.

There are also four who matched 65 out of 67 markers, one a descendant of John Aaron, one from Isaac, one from Jacob and one where we are trying to find the proper ancestor for.

The results being that even though each only varied from the base standard set above by one or two, between these four the results varied by two to four markers.

Tests for three of the group do not support the paper trail for their ancestors. In each case we believe that we have found the reason for the results.

There is also test results of one SCHOCKEY and one SHOCKLEY. Neither is remotely similar to our DNA. Both belong to the R1b1b2 Haplogroup which is a very common unlike Q and Q1b..

The surprising surname that appears a close match at 63 markers out of 67 is Baysinger. If there had been only one such occurrence it would have been marked off as a non marital event. However there are two separate cases. The early versions of this surname were Besinger and Boesiger. Both trace their lines back to the 1600s to different ancestors, one in France and one in Switzerland. The second one only tested 25 markers but those 25 match the one from France perfectly. It would appear that somewhere, not too much further back, that we had a common male ancestor.

We still have had no one test that is descended from Samuel who was John Christopher's son by his second marriage. There are a few other specific families that Marie would like to see tested to either prove or disprove certain theories.

For those who missed this before, part of the following is a repeat from last year. It is important enough to **SHOCKEY** genealogy to be repeated.

The purpose of the SHOCKEY DNA project is to:

- Learn more about our early ancestors and where our ancestors originated.
- assist in identifying descendants of Johann Christoffel SCHACKE, AKA John Christopher SHOCKEY.
- Prove or disprove certain theories regarding some descendant lines that have been questioned.
- Determine if some with variant spellings such as SHAWKEY. SHOCKLEY, SCHOCKEY and others are actually descendants of Johann Christoffel SCHACKE, AKA, John Christopher SHOCKEY.
- Prove the origins of Johann Christoffel SCHACKE and his ancestors and help further our research.
- Prove or disprove the theory that some persons with the SHOCKEY surname are descendants of the SHOCKEY Indian tribe or other Native American group.

The normal cost for the Y-DNA37: 37 Markers
Test is \$259 plus postage. For those who are part of
the Project the cost of the 37 Marker Y-DNA test
\$149 + \$2 postage. The regular cost of the
Y-DNA67 Marker test is \$349 plus postage but as a
part of the project the cost is \$239 + \$2 postage.
They do offer special pricing usually twice a year. I
will try to always announce these on the email list.

When ordering a test kit, you can pay for the test kit by credit card or you can request that they send an invoice with the kit.

The Family Tree DNA test kit consists of two or three sets of cheek scrapers and collection tubes --designed for a single persons use. Each tube contains a fluid designed to arrest bacteria growth, so you can scrape your cheek and return your kit in any type of weather (hot or cold). The freshness of your

sample will remain intact for months. Full details of the test kit can be seen on the following page.

Family Tree DNA is pleased to inform you of the pre-launch of our newest test: the autosomal-based Family Finder test. This pre-launch will progress in phases so that we do not exceed our lab's capacity, and to ensure delivering results in a timely basis. A limited number of our customers are being offered the Family Finder Test during the prelaunch. We anticipate Family Finder will be offered for general release in the middle of March at the breakthrough price of \$249.

While the Y-DNA matches men with a specific paternal line, and the mtDNA finds potential relatives only along the maternal line, Family Finder can look for close relationships along all ancestral lines.

You may now match to male and female cousins from any of your family lines within five generations. The science behind it uses linked blocks of DNA across the 22 autosomal chromosomes and matches them between two people. Based on this concept, our bioinformatics team has worked extensively to develop the calculations that would tell you the closeness of the relationship.

The possibilities to find matches abound:

Which William Shockey?

We have a genealogy puzzle an a new found cousin named Dennis Teegardin-Shockey who needs some help in determining which William Shockey was his father.

Some information that is known is that his mother, Betty J Card, was working at Lear Siegler in Grand Rapids, Michigan during the war making air craft seats Dennis was born in Grand Rapids, MI in December 1945. He found the name of his father written on the back of a photograph of himself after his mother passed away. His mother would always get very upset whenever Dennis ask about his father.

His aunt (mother's sister) remembers this William **Shockey** as being a Navy man but at age 89 Dennis is not sure how good her memory is from 65 years ago.

Shockey might be a descendant of John Aaron based on the two mutations found. Since we have not had any of Samuel Shockey's male descendants test, this line cannot be ruled out either. I originally suspected that he might be a descendant of Isaac but based on the tests, now consider this is not as likely.

Any leads to a William Shockey born in the time frame of 1910 to 1926 that served in the Navy during WWII would be greatly appreciated. A birth in the state of Ohio, Michigan and Indiana seem most likely but any William that served during WWII and was in

the Grand Rapids area during the early spring 1945 would be the one we are looking for..







Valentine SHOCKEY Story

Taken from the History of Western Maryland

Valentine Shockey, son of Christoper Shockey, the patentee of eighteen hundred acres a small part of which was in this county, and the balance in Pennsylvania, became a notorious counterfeiter. He flourished from about 1775 to 1804, when he was in the York County, PA., jail and there, while in prison, George Harbaugh purchased his farm. There is yet to be seen a cave near Mount Misery, east of the Great Falls, on Falls Creek, which is called Shockey's Cave, where he and his confederates made their money, and hid themselves in times when they were fearful of pursuit. This iniquitous business was carried on along these mountains during the whole of the last quarter of the eighteenth century. Shockey resided on the tract bought by George Harbaugh. His house stood between the present stone house and a barn. Once when a posse were in hot pursuit of the counterfeiter, they came to his house in the evening, but he escaped to the mountain. They waited for some time, and then set fire to his house, with the hope that the sight of the flames would lure him from his hiding place, and if he should come to the rescue, they might be able to capture him. The flames soon enveloped the building and the woods around and from the distant mountain shone the red glare of the burning house. From the side of the mountain Shockey looked down on the work of destruction, but he did not leave his retreat.

Shockey was the leader of a terrible gang, whose exploits resounded from Baltimore to the Ohio River. About 1830, on Shockey's old farm, a zinc plate the counterfeit type of a continental note was turned up by a harrow. The cave and the traditions concerning Shockey show him to have been a daring and desperate man and the boldest of the counterfeiters who followed on the heels of the Revolution.

JULY 15-18, 2010 SHOCKEY FAMILY REUNION NORTHWEST

Where? Camp Casey Campus of Seattle Pacific University, on Whidbey Island in the Puget Sound.

Who? The descendants of Arthur Floyd and Rhoda Mae Shockey: parents of Mark, Charles and Eran Shockey are gathering to honor Dr. Charles Shockey who taught biology at Seattle Pacific for 35 years. The ashes of Dr. Shockey and his wife Grace are being laid to rest in a Memorial Rock Garden that will be Dedicated Saturday morning, July 17. Dr. Shockey is the first ever faculty member to be buried on school property by the University. This will be followed by a Salmon Bake at a picnic area a short distance from the Memorial.

Following World War II, Dr. Shockey was know for discovering Government Surplus equipment that was purchased by Seattle Pacific. The most important discovery was that the Government put Fort Casey on that surplus list. Dr. Shockey shared his find with President C. Hoyt Watson. These two men convinced the Board of Trustees to purchase the center 85 acres of the 300 acre property for \$22,000. This included the spacious Parade Grounds, Officers Row on the North, and all the Buildings on the South used to house the 425 enlisted men that served the Fort. A Sea Lab was created close to the Puget Sound where Dr. Shockey could teach Marine Biology with Sea water pumped into is Lab. The Memorial Garden is being created between the Sea Lab and Puget Sound. Dr. Shockey became the first Manager of Camp Casey.

The Washington State Park acquired the 100 acres to the south that included all the big gun emplacements to guard the entrance of Puget Sound from the Pacific Ocean. A Seattle business man bought the 100 wooded acres to the north and appreciated the work of SPU so much that he left his property to the school in his will. In 2001, Seattle Pacific paid \$1,000,000 for the remaining 15 acres of the original Fort with its 10 Buildings are now Fort Casey Inn. They could have purchased those 15 acres at the time they bought the 85 acres for only \$12,000, but the Board of Trustees thought they would never have a use for it. Now it is a real summer tourist attraction.

Three buildings have been reserved for this event according to the number of people who met the registration deadline: The Alumni House West, the

Firehall, and Cottage #4 in Fort Casey Inn. All the other cottages in Fort Casey Inn were released from our verbal hold since last July when we hoped that all the Shockey tribe would join us. They are still available on a first come, first served basis. The Alumni House West and Firehall have a minimum and maximum number of people required to rent these buildings. At present they are reserved at the minimum occupation leaving room for 12 more late registrations. To check out these two buildings go to www.spu.edu/casey. Arthur Floyd Shockey is a sixth generation grandson of Christian Christopher, the ninth child of the originate Shockey immigrant, John Christopher Shockey. I was married to Genevra Grace Shockey (9-8-82) the daughter of Rev. Mark Shockey, the older brother of Dr. Charles Shockey. It was my honor to know Genevra's grandparents, parents, and two Shockey uncles and their families. Therefore it is great honor to head the Memorial Committee that has put this together after Genevra's death.

God used two events in Genevra's life to get this Memorial for her Uncle Charles going. We attend the wedding of Charles and Grace's grandson in 2004 when we learned that their ashes were on the fireplace mantel of their oldest son-in-law. They both died in his home. At Grace's request they were to be cremated without a funeral. The son-in-law had remarried after the death of Charles and Grace's oldest daughter. As we were about to leave his home, he said to Genevra, "I don't know what to do with those ashes." She responded, "I am sure if SPU knew this they would be happy to bury those ashes at Camp Casey." He finished his career teaching in the School of Education at SPU. Sunday morning they took Genevra to the Seattle First Free Methodist Church which had been Charles and Grace's home Church. Bill introduced Genevra in their Sunday School Class. After class in the hallway, she met a couple who had known Charles and Grace. It turned out this man, Bud McDole, had been President of the Board of Trustees of SPU for 15 years. Learning that fact Genevra told him about Charles and Grace's ashes. He said, "I will be in the President's Office tomorrow morning with this news." The rest is history in the making which you are invited to witness.





Oakland, West Virginia Community & Post Office

According to an article published in the Martinsburg Journal, October 3, 1953 the Oakland Post office was to be discontinued on October 31. At the time it was the second oldest Post office in Morgan County having been established January 4, 1833. It was established a short time after Morgan County was formed from Berkeley and Hampshire Counties on the old "Oakland Farm".

The community was settled following the Revolutionary War by Pennsylvanians, mostly from Lancaster County. It is tradition that Captain Christian Hollinger left Pennsylvania to seek land in the Shenandoah Valley that he had purchased from a land agent who had no land to sell. Finding no land to match his deed, he bought cheap land then being offered on Sleepy Creek.. He had his brothers-in-law, sons and sons-in-law with him and they all settled on the farm.

Among the early settlers on the Middle Fork were the Hollingers, Ungers, Widmyers, Bucks, Spellmans, Baileys, Bohrers, Barneys, **Shockeys**, Aulabaughs, Ambroses, Youst and Freehours. On the West Branch were Risers, Fearnows, Zilers, Hovermales, Hinckles and Humes.

Oakland Farm was centrally located and became the center of trade, religion and culture. It had a church, two practicing physicians, a private school, a grist mill, a tread lathe mill, a chair factory, a store and post office by the middle of the 19th century.

This community located on the Old Winchester Grade had two tomato canning factories within a few hundred yards of the post office until the late 1940s. In 1953 the only thing left to maintain the name of the community was the Oakland Methodist Church, a red brick structure, built in 1938 near the site of the original church that was built in 1842. It is located between the two cemeteries containing graves, some of which are over 160 years old. (This is also the cemetery where it appears that many of the **Shockeys** buried there were dug up and moved. Apparently no one still alive knows where these many bodies were moved to or what had happened that was so drastically wrong that anyone would go to such extremes.)

The first public school building was on the road leading from the Winchester Grade to the top of Little Timber Ridge.

The building of the Winchester Grade placed this community on the main line of travel between Bath and Winchester and it was down this road that Lt. General Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson marched his troops during the war between the states. He stopped here and camped, having dinner with "Old Mrs. Shockey" in the large log house on the Oakland Farm, across the road from the post office. It is said that he called Mr. Shockey into the dining room and required her to taste the food from every dish to assure himself that there was no poison food served to him or his staff of officers.

One of the soldiers became ill with "the fevers" and could not continue with the army. General Jackson left pay for his keep and left him in the care of Mrs. Shockey where he died a few days later and was buried in the Oakland Cemetery. His grave was marked with a field stone carved "Confederate Soldier" followed by letters to worn to read.

The community was hit in the early 19th century by the Western movement to Ohio, Illinois and Indiana and many

names found among the early settlers disappeared from the vicinity entirely.

The building of a road on Little Timber Ridge and another in the valley along the foot of Cacapon Mountain bypassed several fords on Sleepy Creek, offering better road conditions and dividing the travel formerly on the Winchester Grade three ways. Then the paving of the Valley Road and designating it as U.S. Route 522 further bypassed this historic community.

Dr. George Bohrer and Dr. Bazil Shockey were among the county's first medical doctors. Bazil Shockey and Robert Buck conducted private schools in their homes for the children of the community, and later in the old log church. The Rev. John Grove and the Rev. Mathias Rizer were early Methodist circuit riders and preached among the people and established the first churches along Sleepy Creek., including the Oakland Church.

George Aluabaugh, the first postmaster, served from January 4, 1833 to March 1, 1837 and was succeeded by Overton F. Helronimus and then the following postmasters: Dr. Bazil Shockey, December 12, 1838; Naomi Shockey, August 2, 1852; Bazil Shockey, January 18, 1856; Jacob Shockey, June 2, 1857; Jefferson Shockey, September 28, 1859. The post office was discontinued September 25,1866 and reestablished September 23,1867. It was again discontinued in February 1869 and reestablished in April 1872 with Richard H Stotler as postmaster. He was succeeded by Richard A Shockey February 23, 1875 only to be discontinued again April 21, 1875.

It was replaced two days later by a new post office about one mile north under the name Morton Grove. This served as the area post office until December 1887 when it was also discontinued.

The area was without a nearby post office until O.B. **Shockey** worked to have the Oakland Office reestablished and November 7, 1900 he was named as postmaster serving until 1902 when he was succeeded by his sister, Mrs. Nora E. Henry..

Over the following years various persons served as postmaster until the final closing October 31, 1953.


Jennifer (Shockey) Radoi's Miniature horses







The follow-up book focuses on the 1950s and 1960s. Favorite hangouts like the Cubby Hole, State Theater, Greenpoint and the Corner are featured.


The faces behind WKSL are shown, Bonnie Shockey said.

An exhibit of Elvis items has museum all shook up

The King's prior showings have drawn big crowds

Elvis Presley has taken center stage again at the Allison-Antrim Museum in Greencastle for the fourth exhibit dedicated solely to the King of Rock 'n' Roll and his music.

"Elvis is like the eternal king of rock 'n' roll as far as I'm concerned," said Bonnie Shockey, president of the museum's board of directors.

Three rooms in the two-story museum house on south Ridge Avenue, just across from the Greencastle-Antrim School, will be brimming with photos, mementos, records and original items owned by Elvis through Jan. 29.

The same collector, a local individual from Franklin County, has provided the museum with memorabilia and original items for the last three Elvis displays, Shockey said.

While this might be the fourth time Allison-Antrim has paid homage to the King, most of the items on display have never been shown before at the museum, she said.

Among the items on display are a beach hat produced in the 1950s for Elvis fans, authentic gold records, a pair of cuff links in the shape of the-

atre masks worn by Elvis the most-popular theme and a host of candid photos of Elvis with his family and friends.

Elvis has proved to be the most-popular display. in the 11-year history of the museum. Shockey said.

"We averaged between 350 and 400 visitors for each previous exhibit," she said. "Actually, this is

due to the eclectic variety of the exhibit."

Most visitors will be baby boomers, Shockey said, but if this display is anything like last time the museum featured Elvis, many children are expected to come, too.

"It's the man, Elvis, that draws them in," she said. "Last time, we noticed many children of elementary age coming in because they were the fans."

Shockey said it was not difficult to arrange a fresh exhibit on Elvis, given the collector's vast assortment of items.

Even after donating items to the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in Cleveland, the Country Music Hall of Fame in Nashville and the Library of Congress, Shockey said the collector still had enough to fill a fourth exhibit, more than 75 percent of which was never before displayed.

According to a sign at the museum, many of the pieces were once owned by a friend of the Presley family.

Allison-Antrim Museum will be open an additional day this month for those who want to see the display, Shockey said.

The museum, which is open Monday through Friday from noon to 4 p.m. will also be open Sunday, Jan. 10, from 1 to 4 p.m. and Saturday, Jan. 16, from noon to 4 p.m. to accommodate those who cannot visit on a week day.

The DNA Project is proving to be quite a successful tool for genealogy. It has made one giant step in proving a connection that we have worked on for years: the proof of Isaac's three youngest children. We do know that about 1784, maybe earlier, Isaac and his family left Morgan County Virginia, now West Virginia, and headed for Kentucky. He spent several years in Harrisonburg, Virginia. He was there when his daughter, Eve, married John Goshen. At some point he left for Kentucky taking his three oldest sons, Abraham, Isaac Jr. and John with him. He is found in Kentucky in the early 1790's. There was no mention of a wife and other children

In 1787, Rosanna Shockey, listed as a widow, married Jacob Shilling in Floyd County, Virginia which is just south of Harrisonburg, Virginia. She has three children: Henry Shockey, born 1779 or 1780, married Mary Wiley, Mary Shockey, born 1782, married Jacob Smith; Daniel Shockey, born 13 October 1785, married Sarah King. Unfortunately, the census had only listed males and females and their ages so I only had the number of children, but no names. I have always believed that when Isaac left for Kentucky with the three older boys, that his wife refused to take her little ones, all under age 10, into that wilderness to be scalped by Indians. She would have needed to find a way to support herself and three little kids so she married Jacob Shilling.

The ages of the older boys fit right in with the ages of the three that were with Rosanna. We have found no other Shockey that she was even likely to have been married to. I realize that genealogy is a puzzle and records at that time were scarce and it is very difficult to be absolutely positive of every little detail, but this family has been researched by some of the best genealogists I ever knew and no proof positive could ever be found. Now we have.

A descendent of Daniel Shockey and Sarah King has participated in the DNA project. He is a proven descendent of Isaac Shockey. It would be real helpful if a descendent of Henry Shockey and Mary Wiley would participate in it. It would just be like icing on the cake.

At the time that Isaac Shockey went to Kentucky, it was listed as a wilderness inhabited mostly by Indians. We know from history that a lot of folks lost their lives trying to make a life for themselves in Kentucky. Some said that Isaac made the trip with Daniel Boone, but my research makes that seem really unlikely. It would have been a good idea though.

Isaac lived about ten years in Mason County Kentucky and died there on 27 April 1801. I have met a lot of the descendents of the three older boys and also descendents of Henry and Daniel Shockey. I attended a reunion of the Kentucky Shockeys and they are wonderful folks and the ladies sure know how to cook!

George Washington was fond of good food. His favorite meal was breakfast and




