Hello Friends and Shockey Cousins,

I hope you all have had a good year. It seems like time flies as we get older. Here it is time to make plans for the 2011 Shockey Reunion.

This year the reunion will be held June 30th through July 4th in Springfield, Illinois. Howard and Grant Shockey have been trying for years to get us to have the reunion in that area. I have about 60 mailing addresses of cousins in Illinois, so now they will have a good opportunity to attend. I have met some of them over the years and it would be good to see them again. Two of our cousins who attended in Shockeysville last year, for the first time, have kindly offered to help in any way that they can. They are Clifford and Sally Hill. I am so grateful to them for all they have done and have volunteered to do. They and Mr. Hill's brother and sister-in-law will cater Sunday Lunch. Directions to the Lunch site will be included.

Grant Shockey sent me a lot of information on motels and attractions in the area. The big problem was finding a motel with a meeting room that was large enough or that we could afford. Finally David went to Springfield and found one.

We have reserved rooms in the Hampton Inn at 3185 south Dirksen Pkwy. For reservations phone 1-217-529-1100 and specify Shockey Reunion. The room rate is \$89.00 plus tax. The deadline for reservations is June 10th. If you are later than that, you may have to pay considerably more. You need to make your reservations early if you need a handicap room as most motels have a very limited number. The rooms do not have refrigerators unless you request one. I have requested that they put one in each of our rooms, but request one just to be sure. They offer a deluxe Continental Breakfast and many other extras. There is a whole page showing directions to the motel and listing all of the things they offer. There are several restaurants in walking distance. The list I have is Cheddars, Outback Steakhouse, Smokey Bones, Bob Evans, Steak 'N Shake, Panera, IHOP, Carlos O'Kelly's and Applebee's. I am not familiar with all of those, but there are about thirty or more down town.

I don't know about shopping. I am sure there are many shops nearby where you can find most anything you need. There has to be a big shopping center or Mall where you can just browse around the way most ladies like to shop.

The Maryland/Pennsylvania Tour was much larger than usual since we had so many folks who had never been to that area. Les had made a special trip to that area earlier in the year so that he would have a better knowledge of the exact spot where John Christopher's original house was located and become a little more familiar with the area. He does a great job as 'tour guide.' Some of the folks who went on the tour had lived in Pennsylvania all or most of their lives and didn't know all of the great Shockey history of that area. A great many of the descendents of Abraham and Christian have always lived in that general area. Christian lived in Somerset which is a little farther away, but there is quite a bit of history there too. There is much more history in that area that we have yet to uncover. Some of the earlier generation are buried somewhere in that area, and we would love to know where. Ralph was shown an old Shockey Cemetery on a farm many years ago when he was doing research. You really couldn't determine anything worthwhile. There was a huge tree growing in the entrance and the graves were unmarked or just had a large rock to mark them and no names on anything. The farmer who led him to this area didn't know anything about it other than it was a Shockey cemetery. Ralph said that the whole place was overgrown with bushes, trees and briars. That was almost forty years ago, so you can just imagine what a jungle it must be now. I was still working at the time when he was doing most of his research, so I missed a lot. I just might have found some things that he overlooked. I would have loved to just see that cemetery.

If you thought that there wasn't anything interesting to do in Springfield, well, there is a lot more than I thought. There is tons of history! History was not my favorite thing in school and I really didn't do it justice, but it is an important part of out heritage. I came to appreciate it more as I grew older. Mr. Hill has taken the time to prepare the following suggestions and ideas of things and attractions you might really enjoy:

SPRINGFIELD, IL IS REUNION HEADQUARTERS

Hello, Shockey cousins! If you are coming to the reunion this summer, hope you will find this helpful; if you are not sure yet, perhaps the information here will persuade you to say Yes!

Springfield is the supreme Lincoln experience. He came to Springfield from nearby New Salem (more below) as a newly-elected member of the State legislature at the age of 28, beginning a public service career that carried him literally from a log cabin to the White House.

The place to start is the Lincoln Presidential Museum and Library downtown at the corner of Jefferson and 6th streets. Plan to spend at least 4 hours to tour both. ((Admission charged. Around the corner on 7th Street is the Springfield Convention and Visitors Bureau where you can pick up brochures and information.) Across the street from the Museum is Union Square Park and Visitor Center, where a 4th of July celebration is held. Nearby is the Lincoln Home - the only home Lincoln ever owned. Start at the Visitor Center at 426 S. 7th where you obtain free admission tickets. There is a video tour, bookstore and gift shop. About half of the original furnishings are on view. It is an accurate and very interesting restoration. Also nearby, between 5th and 6th streets, off the Adams St. pedestrian mall is the Old State Capitol, the seat of IL government then, where Lincoln tried hundreds of cases and served in the state legislature. Here is where he gave his "House Divided" speech and where his casket was brought after his death. (Free admission) An interesting footnote: it was from the steps of this Capitol building that Barack Obama announced his candidacy in 2008. Just south on 6th street is the Lincoln-Herndon law office where the two were partners for 8 years.

The Lincoln Tomb is located in Oak Ridge Cemetery nothwest of downtown, the largest cemetery in IL, on Monument Avenue off North Grand between 1st and 2d streets. All the Lincoln family except Robert are buried here. Other Lincoln sites are the Great Western Depot from which he delivered his "Farewell Address" (10th and Monroe); "Lincoln's Church" the First Presbyterian, where the Lincolns rented a pew (Lincoln seldom attended and never became a member of any church). Mary Todd's funeral was held here. This church has 7 stained glass windows by Louis Tiffany, installed 1890-1922.

Other Springfield Sites of interest are the Illinois State Museum located in the State Capitol complex, a few blocks west of downtown. Exhibits tell the story of the land, life, people, and art of IL. There are interactive displays, dioramas, a hands-on children's discovery room, and more. (Free admission) Close by is the IL State Capitol Building, standing 74 feet higher than the nation's Capitol in D.C. Nearby at 5th and Jackson is the Governor's mansion (free tours). At 301 Lawrence Ave. is the first full expression of Frank Lloyd Wright's Prarie Style, the Dana-Thomas House. The House contains the largest collection of Wright furniture and art glass windows in the world. In Oak Ridge Cemetery find the Korean War Memorial and the W.W. II Memorial.

For the adventurous there are several guided walks: Lincoln's Ghost Walk; Scandalous Springfield Walk; Springfield's Haunted Dead Walk: see www.SpringfieldWalks.com Edwards Place (700 N. 4th Street) is the oldest house in Springfield on the original foundation and contains several major art collections and an art library.

Outdoors: Lincoln Memorial Garden on Lake Springfield with 6 miles of trails and 100 acres of native woodland. Washington Park on the west side, with the world's 6th largest carillon and a botanical garden with a 5000-plant rose garden. Take South Grand Avenue into the park. A Shockey Site: Travel about 20 miles north of Springfield on I 55 to Elkhart, IL. This town is located on the highest hill between Springfield and Chicago (not saying much when IL, the Prairie State, is mostly flat land). It is a sleepy little place, but drive up to the top of the hill and find one of the most beautiful small cemeteries anywhere. There are many Shockey graves there. Back down the hill you will find a quaint, funky restaurant and gift shop, The Wild Hare. (There are also Shockeys buried in Oak Ridge Cemetery.)

Sunday At the Reunion: We will caravan to Clayville (take Rt. 97/125/Jefferson St. Keep straight on 125 at the traffic light when 97 veers off to the right. (See map elsewhere in this newsletter for all sites referenced in this article) It is about 16 miles west of Springfield. Clayville is an old stage coach stop, home to the Broadwelll Inn, and is in the process of restoration. Lincoln probably stayed in the inn as a young lawyer riding the circuit. This is where we will have a delectable dinner. Please let Marie know NOW that you will attend the dinner; we need a head count. After dinner, go back toward Springfield to Rt. 97(traffic light); go left on 97 to New Salem Village, a wonderful restoration of the village where Lincoln came as a young man before beginning his public career, and one of the most educational experiences the Lincoln sites have to offer. The restoration adheres to painstaking attention to authentic detail and interpreters in period dress explain how things were done then. During the summer, Theater in the Park stages outdoor plays and musicals. Check for what might be playing during our reunion. Lincoln's general store was a failure perhaps due to his partner William Berry's drinking more whisky than they sold. Free admission. There is also a well-equipped campground there. A visit to New Salem should cap off an enjoyable Sunday.

Before You Arrive: You might like to try this: Using your cell phone, dial (217) 213-3003; enter the prompt number followed by the # key; enjoy the audio tour of Springfield sites. Hey, hey! Shockey cousins, see you in Springfield!

I do want to thank all of you for your cards, letters and donations to the newsletter. Your continued support is what will keep the newsletter coming and reunions happening. You sent some nice news articles in too! I enjoyed reading them and am sure many others will too. I could use more of the same for next year, so keep that in mind when you read articles in the newspaper or magazines.

The newsletter is the most expensive thing that we do and your financial support is so important. Your direct donations last year paid almost half of the cost of printing and mailing. The cost was as follows. The bulk mail permit was 185.00. Printing 1400 newsletters was \$1,882.57. Mailed 1303 at bulk mail rate and 12 to Canada, \$747.79. Mailed 12 extra, 12.91. Returns for wrong address, moved, left no forwarding address, deceased or unknown, \$30.00. They do not forward bulk mail, so you need to give me your change of address if you have one. I have lived in this house about 27 years and they have changed my address four times. It is a lot of trouble notifying everyone of the change and I can see why it can slip your mind since you only receive this once each year. I am sure you noticed that I did not mail the entire 1400 newsletters. I hand-deliver a lot of them to save postage. I keep a stack of them in my car in case someone should ask for one. Some of them end up in the strangest places. One man read one in a doctor's office in a town that I didn't mail one to. The total cost for last year was \$2,859.27, direct donations were \$2,017.00, a difference of \$842.27. The treasurer refunded that to me after the reunion. The direct donations are all I have to work with until the reunion. You can use the coupon on the last page to make donations and make address changes.

Shockeysville Bible Church this year has been one of continuing service and faith of our efforts. We continue to have services each Sunday, weather permitting. Snow and ice forced us to miss six Sundays from December 2010 through February 2011.

We are waiting for a beautiful Spring to burst forth on the mountain! Then we can start the clean-up from Winter around the church grounds. Also, some of the repair projects around the shelters can be undertaken.

Our attendance has been holding steady at around a dozen. We hope that your coming reunion is well attended.

The meeting opened with the ringing of Aunt Maggie's bell in the church tower.

David F. Shockey, President, welcomed everyone in attendance.

Howard Shockey, Chaplain, led the opening prayer.

The group recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

The board members introduced themselves and told where they were from. As a note, the board members always meet the day before the general meeting.

Those in attendance introduced themselves and told where they were from. The states represented were Pennsylvania, Virginia, West Virginia, California, Illinois, Georgia, Arizona, Indiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Idaho, Maryland, Kentucky, and Ohio.

Howard Shockey read the Memoriam for those Shockey cousins who had passed on this past year.

Donna P. Shockey read the minutes of the 2009 meeting. Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the minutes as read.

<u>Treasury Report:</u> David F. Shockey presented the Treasurer's Report in the absence of Donna J. Porter, Treasurer (copy attached). The beginning balance was \$1,932.39 and the ending balance as of June 23, 2010 was \$2,427.96. Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the Treasury Report.

Newsletter Report: Marie Shockey presented the Newsletter Report (copy attached). Total expenses for the newsletters were \$2859.27; direct donations were \$2,017.00. The amount due to Marie for her expenses was \$842.27.

Marie reported that the donations were at the highest in years. She encouraged everyone to send her articles to be put in the newsletter. Some folks keep the newsletters as references and sometimes request back issues. She requested everyone to send her any changes of address. All donations are greatly appreciated as this is what keeps the newsletters funded.

Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the Newsletter Report and reimburse Marie \$842.27.

Genealogy Report: Les Shockey reported that as of July 2010, there were 19,614 people and 6,931 families listed in the database. Ken Shockey (Pennsylvania) scanned Ralph and Marie's red books. Plans are to combine Gerald Shockey's and Bud Roseberry's databases and put on a DVD.

There are currently a total of 112 on the Shockey Roots Web. There were 14-15 people that bounced off in January, February, and March, probably due to incorrect addresses.

Twenty three people signed up for the DNA testing. There were four perfect matches (67 out of 67); one test from the 37 markers was also a perfect match. There will soon be a new test called "family finder", under the Family Tree DNA. Both male and female can be tested under this.

It appears that the descendents of John Aaron Shockey all had one mutation unique to this line.

Bud Roseberry asked that if anyone has any family group shots or information on their family to provide the information to either him or Les to be put into the data base.

David F. Shockey asked those eligible to please consider participating in the DNA testing. The more participants, the more information can be gathered on the family.

Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the Genealogy Report.

<u>Church Report</u>: Scott Luttrell presented the Church Report. The church is currently operating as an independent church. The church building is in great shape. Money donations being mailed to him from the Treasurer and any donations received at this meeting will be used for repair of the outside shelters.

The Shockey and Luttrell Memorial Fund has been set up. Shockey Construction has been a big contributor toward this. Currently have \$29,000.00 in the fund, which is designated for future use to keep up the church.

Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the Church Report.

Old Business: Discussion about the reunion location for 2011. The tentative decision to hold it in Oklahoma was nixed. The board voted to have the reunion in Springfield, IL over the July 4th weekend. More information will be in the 2011 newsletter. The reunion will be held in Shockeyville, VA in 2012. We are open to suggestions/recommendations for the 2013 reunion. There were no suggestions from the attendees. This will be moved to discuss at the 2011 reunion.

New Business: Les suggested an idea to erect a memorial or marker in memory of John Christopher, somewhere in Westmorland County where he lived. This would be for future discussions - might someday set up a memorial fund.

David F. Shockey pointed out the location of the Shockey Time Capsule Memorial for those who had not seen it. It is located on the 5 acres near the church.

The meeting adjourned at 1:30 p.m.

SHOCKEY Genealogy

First I have a new email address due to finally obtaining a DSL Internet connection. Please use: LesShockey@frontier.com for email to me.

It has been snowing much too often this year and it seems like I have been spending too much of my time out in the cold clearing snow off of our driveway, the church parking lots and the cemetery driveways. There was a time when I really enjoyed getting out and working or playing in the snow but as I get older it seem to have lost most of its appeal. Now if I dress warm enough to start the job on either the tractor or the Sportsman ATV, I soon find my glasses or goggles steaming up. It is not fun especially if the wind is blowing and the effective temperature is in the single digits or lower. I am told that my problem is caused by some of the medications that I must take these days.

At the reunion this past year there were five or six new families as well as two families who had not attended for many years. This group showed great interest in the tours and presented many questions and also took many photos to document the things they were seeing. In the hospitality room Bud and I were kept busy with updating the database and answering questions. Finding new cousins and adding to the database makes the reunion worth the effort taking our computers to the reunions worthwhile.

This was the first year that the Monday tour to Rouzerville, PenMar and Ringgold visited the actual site of Johann Christoffel (Staphel's) cabin as described in the Journal of Charles Mason and Jeremiah Dixon from the Mason and Dixon Survey when they visited him September the 21st and 22nd 1765. As shown in the photo that was in last year's newsletter, there is a small rectangular area outlined with small stones. The grass in this area is different from that in the surrounding yard. I have talked to one of the present owners, Gary Leatherman, to see if he knew anything about the site of the cabin. (Gary and his brother, Dwain inherited the farm from their father, Clarence Leatherman.) Gary was able to give me the name and telephone number of Cleo Martin, the sister of Gilbert Martin, the man his father had purchased the farm from. Ms Martin lived on the farm during the 1950s. She thought that her brother Gilbert had purchased the farm from a man named Hoover who was also a store owner. Further research needs to be undertaken at the county courthouse to trace the full ownership list of this property. I am now wondering if this Hoover was a descendant or somehow related to the Michael Hoover who purchased 75 acres from Christopher Shockey and is described in a deed that was recorded Oct. 21, 1769.

In other news, I was finally able to contact Adrain Shank, the son of Yula Shank. The good news is that he hopes to open the mill for tours at some date in the future after he has completed some restoration. The bad news to this is that his mother's will is being contested and he is not permitted to allow anyone to tour the property nor to start his restoration work until this is resolved.

Another highlight for me for the 2010 reunion was Neil and Diane Shockey bringing me a DVD containing a few minutes of video that they made while visiting Kirchheimbolanden. We believe that the church in the video is the one where Johann Christoffel Schacke was christened on the 8th of June 1720.

Again I wish to thank those who have contributed new or additional information for the SHOCKEY database. The family histories and the photographs are both very much appreciated. I continue to add this material as quickly as I can. It is a major help when data is submitted using a genealogy program that conforms to current GEDCOM standards such as RootsMagic 4. Most programs do conform but Family Tree Maker or Family Tree for Windows do not conform and fail to import data into the proper locations in programs that do meet the standard.

SHOCKEY DNA Project

The SHOCKEY DNA Project is part of the Family Tree DNA. Descendants who carry the bloodlines from John Christopher Shockey belong to Haplogroup Q (most likely Q1b subclade) which is quite rare in comparison to other groups.

The FamilyTree DNA Database continues to grow with 6,241 Surname Projects as of 01/29/2011.

- 101,031 unique surnames
- 198,699 Y-DNA records in the database
- 44,345 67-marker records in the database
- 122,369 mtDNA records in the database

We now have twenty five members in the Shockey DNA Project. We still have only four who have tested and match a perfect 67 out of 67 markers. There is one descendant from Valentine, one from Abraham, one from Isaac and one from Christian Christopher. There is one other who only tested 37 markers but is a perfect match in the first 37 markers to the above four. The two new **Shockey** male descendants include a descendant of John Aaron and a descendant of Jacob.

There are only four of us who have taken advantage of the new Family Finder tests. Three of us

have our results back but since each of us are likely sixth cousins; we are not matching each other. I have 4 suggested 3rd cousin matches, 3 suggested 4th cousin matches and 58 suggested 5th cousin matches. Only in a couple of cases do I see and recognize a surname where the match may be. However most who have tested are not listing their surnames or only limit the listings to a few surnames. I thought that there were many female **Shockey** cousins who were eager for the Family Finder test to become available so they could join in the testing but to date none have taken the test.

I just received word that FamilyTreeDNA are changing their Family Finder test to the Illumina Omni platform and are retesting all existing Family Finder results with this more extensive test for FREE.

Of those who have tested their Y-DNA, there are still four who match a perfect 67 out of 67 markers. There is one descendant from Valentine, one from Abraham, one from Isaac and one from Christian Christopher. There is one other who only tested 37 markers but is a match in the first 37 markers to the above four.

There are now four who match the above group 66 out of 67 markers, one a descendant of Valentine, one a descendant of Abraham, one a descendant of John Aaron and one a descendant of Isaac. There were six who matched 65 out of 67 markers, two descendants of John Aaron, two descendants of Jacob and one a descendant of Isaac and one that we are still searching for his ancestor. Of these last six, each mutated marker or markers were in unique locations. The results being that even though each only varied from the base standard set above by one or two, between these six the results varied by two to four markers.

Tests for two of the group did not support the paper trail for their ancestors. In each case we believe that we have found the reason for the results.

Both Marie and I are pleased with the results that we have obtained to date as they have help prove or solve certain descendant lines where there has been differences of opinion as to the actual ancestors

The results for the one Project member that we were awaiting test results that listed his surname as Schockey showed that he was not a male descendant of John Christopher Shockey.

We still have had no one test that is descended from SAMUEL. We had a promise from one in Ohio that would have provided the results for Samuel but he has not tested yet. We are also hoping for more descendants of ISAAC to help answer some genealogy questions.

For those who missed this before, the following is a repeat from previous years.

The purpose of the SHOCKEY DNA project is to:

- Learn more about our early ancestors and where our ancestors originated.
- Assist in identifying descendants of Johann Christoffel SCHACKE, AKA John Christopher SHOCKEY.
- Prove or disprove certain theories regarding some descendant lines that have been questioned.
- Determine if some with variant spellings such as SHAWKEY. SHOCKLEY, SCHOCKEY and others are actually descendants of Johann Christoffel SCHACKE, AKA, John Christopher SHOCKEY.
- Prove the origins of Johann Christoffel SCHACKE and his ancestors and help further our research.
- Prove or disprove the theory that some persons with the SHOCKEY surname are descendants of the SHOCKEY Indian tribe or other Native American group.



Dinosaur's True Colors Revealed by Team Including UA Researchers

Unlike the movie Jurassic Park, this is real.

Two University of Akron researchers served on a team that has done the seemingly impossible-they have broke a microscopic code hidden in a 160 million-year-old feathered dinosaur fossil to reveal its rich head-to-tail palette and pattern of colors.

"It had been thought for a long time that the color of dinosaurs was always going to be a mystery," said University of Akron assistant biology professor Dr. Matthew Shawkey, a member of the team. "Now we have shown that color can be reasonably reconstructed and this opens up the door to all kinds of questions about the roles of color in the lives and evolution of dinosaurs and their descendants."

An international research team, including Shawkey and postdoctoral fellow Dr. Liliana D'Alba, collected data on modernbird color and melanosome (melanin-containing granules) shapes and used them to assign colors to the fossil feathers. The discovery, funded by National Geographic Society, National Science Foundation and Air Force Office of Scientific Research, provides inroads to data previously thought to be unobtainable.

What purpose could colors in feathers serve? "These feather color patterns evolved before the ability to fly, suggesting that mate attraction or other communication functions were critical to the early evolution of feathers. Feathers may have been used for signaling or camouflage before they were ever used for flight," Shawkey explained.

In addition to the clues colors unlock about feathered dinosaurs, they provide educational and artistic benefits, said Shawkey, giving scientific illustrators the opportunity to more accurately recreate the appearance of dinosaurs for museum exhibits, magazines, textbooks and other mediums.

The team's findings were published in the journal Science, Feb. 4, 2010, "Plumage color patterns of an extinct dinosaur" by Shawkey of UA's Integrated Bioscience Ph.D. program; Quanguo Li, Beijing Museum of Natural History; Keqin Gao, Peking University; Jakob Vinther, Department of Geology and Geophysics and the Peabody Museum of Natural History; Julia Clarke, University of Texas at Austin; and Richard Prum, Yale University.




If you have a set of The Shockey History and Genealogy that you no longer need, I know folks that will pay you for it. There is always someone asking where they can obtain a set.






